Transcription Disclaimer

You will notice spelling and grammatical errors in our transcription of John's diary. We have attempted to preserve these from the original diary to keep our transcription authentic.

We've also likely made some errors transcribing John's writing. Our errors are due to various reasons: John's penmanship, physical damage to the page over time, and John's use of colloquialisms that do not translate easily today.

We tried to balance project perfection with project completion, and therefore could not spend large amounts of time trying to determine every single word that was difficult to transcribe. Because we are attempting to transcribe so many years of diaries, we feel it is important to keep the project moving along and not get bogged down on one or two words that are difficult to read.

We've endeavoured to use a system whereby the reader can quickly discern which text remains uncertain: any word within [brackets] is based on an educated guess. Occasionally, even a guess is not possible, and in these instances we've used [illegible] to denote such text.

Introduction

Thank you for your interest in the Sabine Diaries. Written by my Great Great Grandfather John Sabine beginning on his 23rd birthday in 1876, they capture the comings and goings of everyday life in the Sabine homestead in Riverdale, Digby County, Nova Scotia.

For many years the diaries have laid in wait in the Sabine homestead for a time when technology would enable their proper birthing into the modern age. Crowdsourcing made this project more feasible and its undertaking less daunting. Certainly, resources for the project were minimal and although we endeavoured to minimize errors, errors there will likely be. Oft times John's writing became illegible or the pages were damaged. Our incomplete knowledge of the surroundings and neighborhood inhabitants at the time have likely led to mistaken transcriptions, particularly the transcription of names.

I hope that many generations to come will appreciate the words penned by John Henry Sabine as they offer a rare glimpse into country life in Southwestern Nova Scotia in the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

Background

The story of the Sabine family of Riverdale, Nova Scotia and their descendants begins in the year 1762 when Jeremiah Sabin (great grandfather of Joseph Sabean) arrived in Nova Scotia from Maine. He was one of the founders of the village of Weymouth. His son Willoughby was one of the founders of the Sissiboo Baptist Church, and Willoughby's son David settled in Southville in 1835.

David's son Joseph was granted his first parcel of land in Riverdale on June 19, 1847. Lot 1166 consisted of 111 acres located next to Provost Lake. He paid twelve pounds, two shillings, and ten pence. Joseph built a log cabin on this land in 1848, and began living there in 1849 (the same year he married Ruth McNeill). In 1855, Joseph built a homestead for their growing family (the home that Keith Sabine lives in today).

A story passed down through the generations tells us that Joseph left the homestead to his daughter-in-law Roxanna upon his death. He didn't get along with his son John and thought he was lazy.

Joseph Sabean and Ruth McNeill had the following children:

- Annie Minerva Sabean (1851 1934)
- John Henry Sabean (1853 1920)
- Alfred E. Sabean (1855 1929)

John Henry Sabean was born on 19 Oct 1853 in Riverdale, Nova Scotia. He died on 15 Jun 1920. He married Roxanna Ring, daughter of Samuel Ring and Mehitable Saxton on 25 Dec 1877. Roxanna was born on 23 Oct 1853 in Barton, Nova Scotia. She died on 10 Oct 1954 in Riverdale, Nova Scotia.

John was a farmer, lumberman, and postmaster. He started writing his diary on his 23rd birthday in 1876. John was born with his last name spelled Sabean, but sometime during his life he changed the spelling to Sabine. John ran the first post office as early as 1885 from the homestead.

Transcription

Thursday Jan 1st, 1880 - New Year's Day

W. N.W. Snowed some in the night, and this morning was quite a bluster, but soon cleared up fine. Harold is getting quite smart again. A.M. F. fixed one of the yoke-straps. I wrote a dialogue, "Whar's Your Hoss?" P.M. F & I finished shoing the ox, cut a lot of wood &c. Dan and Fred up the road shooting at a goose. Judson was here tonight to tea. Fred has gone up to singing school tonight. Tom Randall married tonight

I intended, with the beginning of the new year, to make a change in my Diary, by writing in rhyme. I am getting tired of the dry monotonous style. I forgot all about it till now. In the light of the old proverb, "Better late than never," I will begin now by rewriting today's entry. In the rhymes that are to follow, no pretention to Literary excellence will be entertained – only a plain narative of events.

1880 Journal and Diary

Jan 1st

Another year has passed away And now we hail glad New Year's day. Tis twenty seven I have seen Since in this noisy world I've been During last night some snow fell down This morning drifted all around The wind N.W. & storming some But soon all bright and fine become Harold, bless his little heart, Again is getting pretty smart. The straps that go upon the yoke By some unlucky means got broke. This morning F. got them in And fixed them up good again. A dialogue I wrote today For Fred and I in lodge to say. Only one ox last night was done, Today finished the other one. This afternoon finds Dan and Fred With gun & powder, caps & lead. Trying to shoot and old dead [goss] As poor and boney as the duce. Judson was here tonight to tea -A promising young blade is he. Tonight Tom Randall has a bride And all his wants are satisfied.

Friday Jan 2nd, 1880

Wind S.W. blowing – thawing – Father to the mill a sawing.
Dan & Fred are chopping still,
I made a sled-rove – went to the mill
The snow was soft, I broketh roads
And hauled out three (800) loads.
Harold is worse – I almost fear
We yet will loose our little dear.

Saturday Jan 3rd, 1880

W. N.W. Fine but blowing Dannie chopping, F -. sawing. At half past five I got around With team all yoked to go to town. I got there safe at half past nine My load made up with deals & Pine I took to Campbell's - got some flour Some chain link iron and other stuff. I stayed around there 'bout an hour Went to the Station - seen enough To know they'r making money great -They'd neither passengers nor freight. Went and called on Dr Morse, Told him of Harold - he of Course Said 'twas an Epidemic - sure But trust to him - he'd make a cure. When I got home at half past three Harold was smart as he could be.

Sunday Jan 4th, 1880

W. S.E. With hail and rain Harold almost well again Still M. Will C. gave us a call The day passed quickly – this is all

Monday Jan 5th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine as ever
Alf got home from down the River.
D & F are chopping still
F a-sawing in the mill.
A.M. I helped him edge some boards
P.M. I made a start towards
Putting some shoes upon the sled.
Tonight – made whiskers – D & Fred.

Tuesday Jan 6th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy and raw
Dan is chopping – F does saw
F. went to Tusket for to see
Mr Cogswell, but he
Got here at noon with horse & sleigh
He & his wife here spent the day.
At noon the sleigh I finished shoeing
Till night some chores I have been doing
Alf and Harris shoed the horses,
Tonight to lodge with all our forces.
A piece I spoke, then I & Fred
The Yankee dialogue we said

Wednesday Jan 7th, 1880

W. N.W. all past the storm
So mild, so beautiful and warm.
Dan & Freddie chopping still,
F & I sawing in the mill
Alf came to the mill, Chattie, Annie too
Two loads he hauled – all he could do.

Thursday Jan 8th, 1880

The Wind unchanged – the weather good Dan & Freddie starting wood.
Alf hauling from the mill.
F & I are sawing still.
Joe Hankinson & Robt. Ray
Both got their dinners here today.

Friday Jan 9th, 1880

W. S.E. half cloudy and warm,
And looking like a heavy storm
'Tis splendid Wheeling on the road,
And Dan and Alf, each with a load,
Of boards went down to the Cove today
For the hogshead of molasses we got, the pay
Father is sawing – A Petition I wrote
Then out the Settlement I went,
And several signors there I got
And many others gave consent
To have their names affixed thereto
All seemed to think a mail route thro.
This settlement a thing we need
And that we have it all agreed.
Fred cutting cord-wood.

Saturday Jan 10th, 1880

Foggy till night then cleared of bright Wind first South and then West F to the mill, D & F starting wood till Noon. Dan dressed in his best And to Southville went out to see Manzer about buying his rotten old house. Fred chopping has been I cut and hauled ten drags of wood For fire up here to the door Alf went to the Cove with a load of boards which paid up the score. We now owe the Frenchman for molasses no more.

Sunday Jan 11th, 1880

Wind N.W. unclouded, bright.
Clear from early morn till night
A glair of ice hides all the ground
And every body's tumbling down.
To dinner we had parson C---ll
Elishia Jones and Aunt Lydia
And Sears – one of the company
At half past two, as was announced
The preacher arose – his text pronounced.
In twenty fifth of Mathew – at
The tenth verse, and the last of that
The words were these, "The door was shut"
He spoke well on the subject, but
It is his last we hear today
For Tuesday he's to move away.

Monday Jan 12th, 1880

W. S.E. all day and misting
F –. sawing – I assisting
Starting wood was Dan engaged in
Alf has fixed his moccasin.
Scot – a happy boy is he –
Tonight he's in a mighty glee
He's got a pair of rusty skates,
I don't know even if they're mates
He's bragging what he's going to do.

Tuesday Jan 13th, 1880

W. N.E. and blowing All day and Evening snowing. As near as I call tell About three inches fell
F and I are sawing still,
Alf starting lumber from the mill.
Fred cutting cordwood much offended
Dan his old boots today has mended.
Tonight is lodge, but naught occurred
Worthy of saying any word.

Wednesday Jan 14th, 1880

The wind from N. all bright & clear. The temperature is quite severe. Father to the mill again. Dan and Fred and Alf remained Round about the house all day The most they've done I think is play. Out to the Bridge went Roxy and I. Down the River I went to try Mrs Cotter for money but only got her To pay for twenty five lbs of butter 5 dollars, alas! was all I got, But even that was better than naught. At Mrs Randall's we got our tea, We then the Rail cars went to see. We saw the comming and going train, At the Station awhile remained, And then set out for home again.

Thursday Jan 15th, 1880

W. S.W. and snowing some,
Not much snow however come.
F & I sawing all day.
Alf down the River with a load for Ray.
Annie & Annie down to Mrs W's
Tonight we mustered all our crew.
And up we went to singing school.
There chanced to be a certain fool.
Well known about as Manda Hix,
With whom the boy cut divers tricks

Friday Jan 16th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy and warm.
Lookind something like a storm
Chopping cordwood are Dan & Fred.
Alf went to the Bridge with a load on the sled
To the mill today were F & I.
This afternoon we did apply
Ourselves to running logs in the pond

They were froze in the ice which we went upon The ice 'mong the logs was very thin, And we were in danger of tumbling in, But we worked away with determined will And soon with logs the pond was filled Gussie Newcomb came in with Alf, you see, And tonight we were all over there to tea The evening passed pleasantly away With conversation, fun and play

Saturday Jan 17th, 1880

W. S.W. Cloudy and warm,
Still looking like, but yet no storm.
Fred and Dan were starting wood
F & I sawed what we could.
Alf went down to his brush & hauled up some loads
Of logs and left them on skids in the road.
Some boys and girls were here tonight
Who laughed and played with all their might.

Sunday Jan 18th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy and warm
Looking like – but still no storm.
Alf & Chattie took Annie & Gussie away
The rest of us were home all day.
Harris Cosman & Alonzo G.
Were here awhile – Lonzo stopped to tea

Monday Jan 19th, 1880

W. N.E. Snowed a little but cleared away, Warm and pleasant the rest of Day Saturday Father hurt his back.
So Alf & I sawed in the mill – (sawed 8 l) Dan & Freddy getting logs ready And little Harold is ill.

Tuesday Jan 20th, 1880

W. S.E. Clear and fine.
I've been sawing spruce and pine
Alf went to the mart
With the sled or the cart,
F. & D. & Fred shoing the Bob sled
I've been sawing with all my might.
We all went up to Lodge tonight
When from Loge to home we come
It was beginning to snow some.

Wednesday Jan 21st, 1880

W. S.E. then shifted round.
Rained some first then snowed
Dan & Fred were hauling logs
They hauled to the mill three loads
I have been sawing. Alf fixing
his moccasins. Harold is sick
with a cold.

Thursday Jan 22nd, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but the air is chill. I've been sawing in the mill Alf helped me edge this afternoon, We ought to go at logging soon. The weather's good & not much snow How soon it may change we don't know. Dan and Fred logging today Twenty five hauled tonight they say. Fred's gone to singing school – tis plain, That all he cares about is Jane.*

*Presumably Nancy Jane Cosman, daughter of neighbour Charles Cosman. Nancy went by this full name in the 1881 census, but simply as "Nancy" in 1871. She eventually marries Alonzo Grant.

Friday Jan 23rd, 1880

W. S.E. Till night
Now shifted to the west,
Raining with all its might.
With scarce a moment's rest.
I've been away to the mill
Alf helped me there till noon;
I worked sundown untill,
Then came home by the light of the moon.
Father and Dan & Fred
Have stayed in the house they said.
Out of the rain and cold
Dear little Harold's Cold,
Is very bad, but I
Hope it will soon pass by.

Saturday Jan 24th, 1880

W. W. Cloudy till night When it cleared up in the West Beautiful and bright.
Alf, out to the Bridge went he,
And a load of boards he took.
Father, Dan and I all three,
Have been to the mill – and Freddie he
Has been cutting logs by the brook.
F & Dan put two logs in the slip
Which long has needed repairs
One could scarcely go up and down
Without being triped.
Seven logs we sawed for Dan
The first he has ever had sawen
If he lives to be an old Man
Of his lumbering this is the dawn.

Sunday Jan 25th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and lovely & bright We all went out to hear Willoughby preach I went to W.H.S's and stayed till night. And then my home I reached The text was in the 5th of Mathew. From the sermon on the mountains "They who have pure hearts are blessed, For they shall see God forever" Obed came with me his evening When I came home from Wm Henry's Willoughby preached here in the eving And his subject was the instance Of the man who had the devil Cast from him and sat & listened Clothed in his right mind & sitting Meekly at the feet of Jesus.

Monday Jan 26th, 1880

W. W. and lovely
Fine as any day in Summer.
Willoughby's boots has F. mended,
Dan & F their logs were hauling
And for Dan I have been sawing.
Alf took out a load of lumber
And brought me a lot of papers
One was "Young Folks" come from Harper
And another "Illustrated Canadian News" the other.
And some Circulars from Stinson.
Little Harold cough is dreadful
And I fear it is no better,
Tonight went Fred starched and polished
To Geo. Cosman's candy party.

Tuesday Jan 27th, 1880

W. South East and partly sunny. F. & Dan to mill a'sawing Twenty five logs for Dan they finished. Alf and Fred starting out lumber Partly ours and partly Dannie's. Quite unwell today I'm feeling And I've spent the day in reading Mostly, but some wood I cut up -Some for Alf and some for our stove. And I fixed some skates for Cottie, And tonight he put them on him In the road upon an ice pond He to skate has been a-trying. If he grows to be an old man, This event he will remember So his first attempt at skating Today it almost has been sultry With a soft warm wind a blowing And the snow has vanished swiftly. I went up to Lodge this evening, Where we had much sport debating "Which is to be most admired Works of Art or Works of Nature." Chattie is most dead of tooth-ache -Harold most as well as ever For which I am very thankful. Began this evening raining heavy.

Wednesday Jan 28th, 1880

Wind S.E. and still a-raining
Rained all night exceeding heavy
And continued hard till mid-day.
This has been a heavy rainstorm
Heaviest weve had this Winter,
Filling swamps and brooks & ditches
And will make us plenty sawing.
Today I wrote a toast for Freddie
Annie's oil boots Dan is mending
Tonight I cut a lot of firewood.

Thursday Jan 29th, 1880

W. N.W. & Cold and windy This forenoon I went with Alfred Cut some logs and then went cruising In the old haunts of our logging F is helping Dan and Freddie Start out hemlocks from their burnt land. P.M. F is home a choring, Made for Alfreds shop a side-door I began some shoes for Harold

Friday Jan 30th, 1880

W. S.W. and partly cloudy Cold and sharp, but still not windy. Looking though a storm was nearing, Father to the sawmill sawing. Says the water raised six inches. Dan and Freddie logs are chopping. Alf and I went out to Tusket, To the Alride farm together, Alf with horses, I with oxen, And when we our carts had loaded, Alf's with meadow, Mine with upland Hay, we drove in home together. Alf had Joseph Porter's hav-rick So this evening we unloaded It, and then he took it to him. I do not feel well this evening All my bones are badly aching, Like a heavy cold beginning. Father got tonight a letter From his old friend Mrs Cogswell.

Saturday Jan 31st, 1880

W. S. but soon it shifted. It began to snow last evening Turned to rain with heavy blowing Rained and blew all night so frightful That it fairly made things clatter Rained a little while this morning Then cleared off as fine as Summer. Alf and C---v went down the River Father & Dan to mill a-sawing Sawing logs to Dan belonging, This forenoon I assisted Freddie Put upon his shoes two patches. P.M. We the hav unloaded That I brought last night from Tusket. Then I fixed the fence that blew down Fixed the pig-pen door that fell down, Put a board upon the roof, and Cut some wood, and then I mended Up a pair of Skates for Cottie And then he & I and Freddie

Went down to the lake a minute To see Cottie try the skates on.

Sunday Feb 1st, 1880

W. N.W. But all day shifting.
But quite pleasant – slightly thawing.
Now and then a little squally –
Scattering snow-flakes falling slowly.
Fred went out the road to meeting.
Rox and I read "Grace Abounding",
That delightful work of Bunyan,
In our room upstairs with Harold
There our little fire burned brightly
And we spent the day in reading.
Tonight its snowing some & blowing.

Monday Feb 2nd, 1880

W. from N. and cold as Greenland Snowing last night two or three inches. And this morning blowing – blustering Blustering untill 'bout midday Then it cleared up and grew milder. In the house we stayed this forenoon. P.M. Dan and Fred hauled lumber Lumber that belonged to Dannie. Father in the wood a cruising I some firewood have been cutting And a piece for lodge been learning, One of those sweet poems of Cowper. Its subject is the bliss of "Freedom."

Tuesday Feb 3rd, 1880

Wind from East, and dark & cloudy,
Dan by 'Justine's' cutting bushes
For us Fred is hauling lumber,
F & I went in the forest.
Where we purpose to go logging,
There we cleared some roads &c.
Across the rear of Joseph Porter's
Soon a storm burst forth with vengence
Snowing, blowing, whirling, whirling.
How the tree tops lashed together
Sending down the snow in dense clouds
Almost burying us beneath it.
But we worked the more unheeding
How the storm fiends shrieked around us
We only took a small "bite" with us

So ere night for home we started. And the scene, I'll ne'er forget it, Of the elements in fury On the lakes we did encounter. Winter all his legions summoned To one dread and awful contest And the lake their field of battle. How they rushed and roared & shouted Mingling in fierce confusion Whirling, howling, roaring, thundering. But at last we got home safely. Where we found that Alf & Chattie, Had got back from Down the River. Rox and I each had a letter, Mine from Rev. J.D. Skinner Roxy's letter from her mother

Wednesday Feb 4th, 1880

W. N.W. half clear, half cloudy
Snow-flakes now and then aflying
Father made a new axe handle
For a new axe Alf got for him.
I hinged on the stable window
Then we cut a lot of stove wood.
Dan & Fred today are logging
Alf is hauling up to Wagoner's
Mill some logs he has been cutting
Today the school has been inspected
By one lawyer Morse from Bridgetown.
Yesterday snowed 'bout four inches.

Thursday Feb 5th, 1880

W. N.W. Quite fine and pleasant. Dan by Justine's cutting bushes. Alf is hauling logs to Wagoner's F. & Fred and I are logging It was late when we got at it And today we hauled nine, only.

Friday Feb 6th, 1880

Wind unchanged & still quite pleasant Dannie down a-cutting bushes Alf is still alogging F. Fred and I are logging Fifteen logs today we got out. Tuesday night myself and Roxy began to paste in our big scrap-book.

Saturday Feb 7th, 1880

W. N.W. Quite fine and pleasant. Alf went out today to Weymouth. For us a barrel of flour he brought in A.M. Dan is cutting bushes P.M. Chores around the house he's doing. Today has been a day unlucky, Both to Fred and I unlucky. Just before the call to dinner As I trimmed upon a spruce tree And my sharp axe stood behind me Down I slipped as quick as lightning. On the axe that stood behind me. And a sorry gash inflicted. Then for home at once I started, Limping, limpping, limpping. And at night came Fred a-limping. He upon his logs were riding With his long legs dangling downwards And before the young lad knew it— Of the girls no doubt was thinking. Both his feet were fast - he yelled out At the oxen to have mercy But they heeded not nor cared they And went on – but how he yelled out Murder – murder – murder – murder With a superhuman effort he to free himself succeeded And upon the ground rolled madly Kicked and howled and danced outrageous.

Sunday Feb 8th, 1880

W. N.W. Quite cold but pleasant. Rox and I all day read Bunyan. Dan & Annie went out sleighing Out to W.H. Sabean's

Monday Feb 9th, 1880

W. N.W. Quite fine as ever.
Dan his logs today were chopping.
F. has been hauling firewood.
Jake Gavil happened here to dinner
And he stayed till night & cut wood
And tonight came Hartshorn Mullen
For to see about a meadow.
Alf for himself has been trucking.

Tuesday Feb 10th, 1880

W. N.W. but changed to Eastward. Quite cold early, but grew milder Quite fine early, but grew cloudy And tonight looks like a snow storm Alf a load took down the River. Dan a load of deals took out, and They the first of his own lumber That he's ever hauled to Weymouth. P.M. Father has been into The forest getting ready timber. Little Harold boy was taken With a sudden stubborn hoarseness So like croup we all were fearful That our little boy was dangerous All day long and all the night long Roxy tended him so patient Mother too with herbs and bottles Watched his little changing symptoms And administered with prudence. I am reading "Pilgrim's Progress" Though I read it in my boy-hood, Now I find it full of marrow. Terrible to Campbellism ---

Wednesday Feb 11th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine quite cold but pleasant, Snowed last night four or five inches. Alf & Harris down a logging, Dan is hauling logs for himself. F. in the forest chopping. Jake Gavil has been here a chopping Fire wood all day. Little Harold Is, we think, a little better. Last night Roxy, I & Harold Stayed all night here in the kitchen Where we could keep little Harold Warm and doctor him convenient.

Thursday Feb 12th, 1880

W. S.E. and dark and cloudy,
Dan is logging with our oxen.
Till the rainstorm drove him homeward
First began this morning snowing
But it gradually grew warmer
Till at noon but rain was coming
Helping Alf cut logs was father

All the forenoon. Little Harold
Is today a little better
Today I sent by Blin to Weymouth
Got for him some Cherry Balsam
And we hope will cure his coughing
Last night we stayed down stairs with him.

Friday Feb 13th, 1880

W. S.W. but warm and cloudy
F. & Dan to mill a sawing
They are sawing there this evening
I half-soled a shoe for Cottie.
I am so I can get round some
Milk the cow and clean the stable,
Fetch in wood & lug the water.
Tonight there came one Capt. Mallet
To trade horses with my brother.

Saturday Feb 14th, 1880

W. S. But come to the northward. Last night rain came down in torrents Till towards night it was foggy
Then the wind came to the northward Then came cold & began freezing
Dan and father still are sawing
Logs for Dan they are a-sawing
Chopping wood for Alf is Gavil
Alf, I think, today is loafing,
Harold's getting most recovered,
Fred & I are getting better.

Sunday Feb 15th, 1880

Wind S.E. & Dark & Cloudy About noon began a-hailing Hailed awhile till the wind shifted To N.E. When stopping shortly Began again & snowed a little One inch only altogether. With his colt went down the River Alf to trade his colt with Mallet All the rest are home a-reading, I am reading Pilgrim's Progress It is full of good instruction.

Monday Feb 16th, 1880

W. N. cold and cloudy
Till night when it cleared off brightly.
Dan is helping Father logging.
Fred went up to "dun" B. Wagoner
I cleaned out the pig pen, and I
Read and wrote some verses &c.
Alf got home from down the River
The "Courier" says Saddie Saunders
Of Sandy Cove at last is married.

Tuesday Feb 17th, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudless, lovely
Pretty warm, and thawing slightly
Dan & Father still a-logging.
Fred and I are still here loafing
But my cut is getting better,
And I hope soon to be moving,
Alf I think has been at logging –
Tonight he shoing up his bob-sled.
Tonight to Lodge we went as usual.
And with Father, Mother, Harold,
Basal Amero spent the evening.

Wednesday Feb 18th, 1880

W. S.W. Soft & thawy. A.M. F. D. & Freddie went logging This afternoon F. left the wood & went to the mill to saw for Basil Amero. Gavil cut wood here all day. I wrote a Constitution for our Society.

Thursday Feb 19th, 1880

W. S.W. till towards night when it shifted to N.W. and began to freeze. Fine and beautiful – but blowing. hailed some Father and Dan to the mill sawing. Fred cutting bushes down to the corner I have mended old shoes today

Friday Feb 20th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy & quite cold. F. sawing – Dan & Fred hauling logs for us. I have been mending old shoes most all day. Judson & Frank [Kate] came here this forenoon. They were here to dinner. Afternoon F. went to Wm Cosman's J. stopped here till night He brought in two pieces of wood for plane woods. Mother had a knitting party this afternoon.

Saturday Feb 21st, 1880

W. S.E. Fine till towards night when it looks like a storm – in fact is snowing some. F. sawing – Dan & Fred hauling logs for us. I mended shoes till towards night, when I dressed out a piece for a plane wood.

Sunday Feb 22nd, 1880

W. N.W. Beautifully fine. It is Willoughby's turn but he has not come Roxy & I have been been up in our room reading all day. Wm Mullen & wife came here tonight. Cereno White died this afternoon at five oclock.

Monday Feb 23rd, 1880

W. S.E. Pleasant – looking like a storm. F. D & Freddie in the wood logging. Wm Mullen went home this morning. Lonzo has begun to work for Alf today. I have been working some J's plane. My cut is getting better slowly. I will soon go to work again (School Meeting)

Tuesday Feb 24th, 1880

W. N.E. Snowed about an inch last night – snowed some and blustered all day. We thought it hardly fit to go to Lodge tonight. Judson came in and spent the evening. He took his jack-plane home that finished today. He is very pleased with it. F. – Dan & Fred logging. Alf logging

Wednesday Feb 25th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & beautiful – thawing. F. Dan & Fred logging. Alf logging. I carried water for the "women" &c, and made Judson a smoothing plane. Tonight I let Capit have the carriage to go to his father's funeral tomorrow.

Thursday Feb 26th, 1880

Wind South East. Hazy and warm. Looking like rain. F. Dan & Fred logging. I finished Judson's smoothing plane. Joe Handkinson was here today. Little Harold had his hair cut today for the first time. He looked real cunning. Roxy saved one little golden lock. He is getting very full of baby tricks. One of his main ones is to get into the bread when it is put down to raise. Some little words he is beginning to lisp. When any person goes out the door, he says "By, By – go – door". Every thing with him is "Taboo" & "Ta-co", and when anything sad happens to him

he puts on a doleful face and says "O, the bo!" When he wants a drink he says "De, de, de." He is well now, and as precious as can be.

Friday Feb 27th, 1880

W. N.W. Clear, fine and warm. I don't think I ever saw so fine and warm a day in Winter. F & Dan sawing logs for Basil A. Fred cutting cord-wood. I made a jointing plane for Judson. I have been half sick today. [Mires] Graham was here this afternoon. We heard today that Charlie Campbell & Lib Rice are married, and that Mrs. Harris (Jane Taylor) is dead.

Saturday Feb 28th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine and very warm. Clouded up towards night and looking like rain. Father sawing. Dan & Fred cutting cord-wood. This morning Scot and I went over by Bear Lake and got the cattle which "laid out" last night. We went across the lake. Scot had his skates. He can make quite a "first" skating. After I came home I made mother a flower box. I then till night have been getting out some stuff to make little Harold a crib. This afternoon Scot went out to Mr White's and borrowed me their hollowing plane.

Sunday Feb 29th, 1880

W. S. till night when it shifted to S.W. Began raining in the night & continued heavily a good part of the day. Alonzo was here awhile this afternoon. I have been reading Bunyan's "Holy War". I enjoy it wonderfully. Hilare Amero and Anna Bell Nichols were married a week ago last Thursday.

Monday March 1st, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudy this morning but cleared off beautifully. Alf went out today with the carriage to get some parafine oil for W.H. Sabean. D. & Fred Began to make fence around D's burnt-land. F & I sawing. The pond is Leaping full of water. F went out to Como's tonight to see if he could get some butter.

Mother is quite sick with a sore throat and lame stomach and side.

Tuesday March 2nd, 1880

W. N.W. Clear and cold. Alf took a load of lumber to the Bridge for Dan. Dan & Fred went out too. Father went to Tusket to buy butter. He got a few pounds. I sawed alone. I sawed ten logs.

At the club tonight we elected officers. For W. [P.] we appointed Dan Fullerton. Mother is better. We are all, save Mother, pretty well now

Wednesday March 3rd, 1880

W. S.W. – South tonight. & looking like a storm. Dan began to hew his house frame. Lonzo helped him. F & I sawing. We sawed 348 feet of boat boards for Joe Hankinson, and 176 feet of hardwood for him. Alf came to the mill with the oxen & hauled the hardwood log, and after we had sawed them, he hauled them out. Fred has been cutting wood for Dan. Mother is better. I am not very well.

Thursday March 4th, 1880

Wind South, but shifted to N.W. Rained some in the night & till towards noon – then cleared off. F. sawing. Dan went to the mill with him, but the rain stopping he came home & he and Alonzo went at their timber. Alf tinkering in the B. S. Shop. I helped him some, and the rest of the day, I worked at Harold's Crib. Fred loafed till noon, then helped Dan.

Friday March 5th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy – Began to rain towards noon & continued till night when the wind shifted. F & I sawing. Dan and Lonz hewing timber. Fred started for home this morning. I felt sorry to see him go, after he has been here with us so long. I have been very unwell for some time. I fear I shall be no better unless I get some medicine. We have a great deal of work to do this Spring and I would like much to have good health, but I should not complain for I have better health than I deserve.

Saturday March 6th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy and cold. There came little dust of snow last night. Alf went down the River, taking Joe Hankinson some boat-boards &c. Dan and Alonzo hewing timber. F & I getting up wood. I hauled 15 drags & two sled loads.

Sunday March 7th, 1880

W. S.W. Partly Clear – looking tonight like a storm. I have been home all day reading Bunyan's "Holy War". Annie & Dan went up to "Communion" They stopped to Charley's to tea.

Monday March 8th, 1880

W. S. This morning. Snowed a little dust last night, and a few little squalls came today. W. Shifted about noon to North and became cold. F. sawing. Dan hewing timber. Alf logging. I went out with a load of deals to Campbells. I had about 844 ft. I got a barrel of flour price of which was 8.90 cts. I also got a broom. Yester little Harold walked out doors for the first time. His Gammie took him over to Aunt Chattie's. He walked all the way over.

Tuesday March 9th, 1880

W. E. & S.E. Clear in the morning, but clouded up. Very sharp. F. sawing. He finished Basil's logs. Dan hewing timber. Alf went out with a load of deals & boards. I took out a load of deals. I took 1094 ft of Dan's deals to pay for what he took of ours – He took 1035 ft – therefore ther's 61 ft coming to Dan. We had Lodge tonight. Judson came in with me. I got my tea to W.H.S's.

Wednesday March 10th, 1880

W. S.E. till noon, when it shifted to N.W. Cloudy & squals of snow this forenoon. Dan hewing. Alf working at something. F & I logging. We hauled some windfalls &c – hauled about 14. There came a little dust of snow last night. We conclude to go in again tomorrow. Judson & Herbie stopped here last night.

Thursday March 11th, 1880

W. N. Partly clear, and awfully cold The air today is very sharp. Alf went out today with a load to Ed. Rice and got a barrel of flour. Dan half soled his boots. F & I logging. We hauled 18 logs. Our brown ox is very sick.

Friday March 12th, 1880

W. S.E. when it shifted to N.W. Clear till about noon when it clouded up and snowed about 1½ in. Dan finished his frame – his hewing. F & I logging we hauled 15 logs, and moved out. We have hauled 235 logs.

Saturday March 13th, 1880

W. N.W. Quite clear and cold. Alf went down the River – he & Chattie. AM. Dan peddaling around. F. cut some wood &c. P.M. Dan hauled down his timber with my mare. I half-soled my boots, dressed out an axe-handle, cut some wood &c.

Sunday March 14th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy & gloomy. Towards night snowed about an inch or so. F & Dan went out to see Mr. White I have the read American Messenger today and Bunyan's "Bad Man" I have read.

Monday March 15th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but quite cold. About half the snow has thawed off. Alf hauling logs &c. Dan & Alonzo hewing timber. F. & I. sawing. We sawed some collar beams for Dan. Dan was to the mill this afternoon. He & I came out the old mill road. It has been a long time since I was along that road. It looks like old times. Will Cosman is here tonight. We heard tonight that Mrs Calvin Holmes has lately died. Will C. here tonight.

Tuesday March 16th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy & looking like a storm began storming towards noon - snowing and continued though not heavily, till night. A.M. Lonzo hewing. F. fixing his accounts. Dan & I sawed up a sap-trough stick. PM. Dan & Lonzo hewed a stick for a sled tongue. I dressed out some stuff for W.HS. a window. Alf started to Weymouth, but broke his axel & returned. No Lodge tonight because of the storm. Mother & Annie are sick.

Wednesday Mar 17th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy. F. fixed the bob-sled bunk &c. Dan discharged his man and went cutting fence poles. Alf with Harris hauling logs. Will Cosman & I went up to Long Tusket to see our meadow. We crossed four lakes. They are as solid as can be. There is plenty of snow in the woods for hauling.

Thursday March 18th, 1880

W. N. Clear and cold. A.M. I helped Alf haul logs to Wagoner's mill H. Cosman helped him too. P.M. F.

planed a slide tong for the truck. I worked at W.H.S's window. Alf went out and got the truck axle mended. Chattie went out to Mr Whites. Dan cutting poles all day. The white cow calved this morning – our first calf of the season. Annie is getting better, but Mother is still

Friday March 19th, 1880

W. S.E. Snowed a little – then shifted to N.W. Soft all day. Alf went out with a load. F. cutting fence poles in Will's swamp. I helped Dan haul some trees to the mill for clap-boards and shingles.

Saturday March 20th, 1880

W. N.W. Blowing & raw, but fine F & I cut fence poles in Will's swamp. Alf and Dan went with two teams to the Alride farm and got two loads of hay. I got a letter tonight from Fred. Rox got some circulars & Annie too.

Sunday March 21st, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & quite warm. This morning, F. Dan & I went out to hear Willoughby preach. Text in Romans. W.H.S. & I came in together after meeting. This afternoon He & I went up to Communion. Meeting here tonight. Text – John 1 & 5. Roxy & I took Harold to the barn today to see the White bossy. He never was to the barn before. He is well & smart now

Monday March 22nd, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & muddy. I have been hauling fence poles to make fence across the road from Blins. Alf went to the Cove with a load of boards. Dan cutting logs. Rama Cereno came tonight & got the calf. We gave it to him.

What a dry old Diary

Tuesday March 23rd, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & beautiful. A.M. I finished hauling poles for the fence. Saturday I sold my old black mare to Dan, and today he & Joseph Porter are hauling logs to the mill. Alf is cutting cord-wood. P.M. F & I cutting poles. We had a good lodge tonight, five being initiated. David Porter, Charlie White, Herbie Sabean, Winnie Sabean, Annie Kate. We had a good meeting.

Wednesday Mar 24th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy – Began snowing at noon continued severely till night. Dan went out with his mare and a load of Deal. A.M. F. cutting poles, I starting them out to the road. P.M. I have been grinding up an old axe for Scot. F. mended Scot's boot. Sarah Cosman has been here today. The priest was in to see Mrs Blin today. She is very low.

Thursday March 25th, 1880

W. NE & N. Stormed all night, and heavily all day. We have not had a greater storm and bluster this winter – Over a foot of snow has fallen. I finished grinding Scots axe and made a handle for it.

Good Friday March 26th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy. A.M. Shoveling snow in the road. The road is rarely drifted worse. Dan went to the to break his road – he brought out some of his deals. P.M. I drove our team to the Corner & back to break the road. I then worked in the wood house at WHS's sash. F is about laid up with a lame back. Dan went to the mill this afternoon and hauled 2 turns of logs.

Saturday March 27th, 1880

W. N. Fine, but quite cold. I went out with a load of deals. I started before daylight. I took, or started with about six hundred. I got along very well till I got to the Rocky Barren: there I found the snow badly drifted but I treaded before the oxen, and so got through. The Henderson barren was quite bare, so I left part of my load. I then proceeded without difficulty till I got to Payson road. That was all bare and muddy. However I got along to Lucy's where I was obliged to leave part of my load again. I then went on and got to Campbells with six deals – 260 feet. Alf & Harris put their horses in tandem on a load of Harris' and got as far as H's barren. Harris came back, but Alf went on to the Bridge with his colt, and got a Bbl or meal.

I got a bbl of meal – and some things for Roxy. I saw Tom Randall & engaged him to get me a [sute] of clothes from Boston. Judson came in with me tonight and stayed all night. Dan has been hauling logs today. Mother got the first number of her paper – "Fireside magazine".

Sunday March 28th, 1880

W. N.E. Cloudy and gloomy. Judson here all day. Herbie came in tonight. I have been reading Bunyan's "Bad Man" &c. Mrs Blin was taken worse last night, and Jimmy & Alice came up in the night for Mother. I was taken in the night with a lame back. I can scarcely move today.

Monday March 29th, 1880

W. N. Quite fine – but raw & cold. F. went out to Jim Hassets to see about getting some hay.

Mrs Blin died this forenoon at about 10 Oclk. Mother,

Annie, Chattie and I were there. Alf went out today to get some things for Mr Blin. Dan is logging – Judson has been helping him. I made an axe-handle.

Tuesday March 30th, 1880

W. NE & N. Cloudy and the wind blowing heavily. F & Joe Comeau making a coffin over to Alf's. Dan is logging. Alf & Jos. Porter went out to Hassets for hay – got a ton. I put a handle on my axe and cut some wood. I made three sap-troughs. They are covering the coffin tonight.

Wednesday March 31st, 1880

W. N.E. Blowing and blustering. This morning F. Dan & I. shovelled a road to get the loads of hay around through the orchard to the barn – the hill being blustered full. They left their loads under the hill last night. I wrote a letter today to go to Fred. This afternoon F & M went down to Mr B's to see the corpse.

Thursday April 1st, 1880

A.M. We all broke the road to let the funeral through. Dan took the corpse down. P.M. F. helped Alf haul wood. I made sap-troughs to the back door. I made 39. The wind is still the same, but the weather has greatly moderated – the wind having gone down.

Friday April 2nd, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudless, calm, and beautiful. A.M. We finished breaking the road this morning – then I went and started up three sap-trough sticks from Will's swamp. Alf clearing roads to start C-wood. Dan took John Ed's waggon home. P.M. F. helped Alf start wood out. I

finished W.H.S.'s window and made a lot of "spiles". Mr Grant's school ends today.

Sixteen years ago today I well remember. It was a fine day like this but no snow on. I tapped some trees that morning. In the afternoon F. began a little mill for Alf & I. I was as happy as a lark.

Saturday April 3rd, 1880

W. Southerly – Fine in the morning but clouded up and rained some through the afternoon.

A.M. F. helped Alf start C-wood. P.M. he helped me make Sap-troughs. I have worked at them all day. Dan is logging – got Jim Manzer helping him. Roxy got a letter tonight from her Mother.

Little Harold put two words together today for the first the words were these "All gone" Roxy & I moved our bed down stairs.

Sunday April 4th, 1880

W. Still Southerly – Drizzling rain. Roxy & I read in the room all day – Baxter and the Bible

Monday April 5th, 1880

W. S.W. Drizzly this morning but soon cleared away about noon

It rained very heavily last night with heavy thunder. A.M. F & I sawed up the last of our sap-trough stuff P.M. We made a string of fence across the road from Blins. Dan went out this afternoon to go work at Tom Randall's vessel. This is a very Spring-like day. Mr Blin heard a frog today

Tuesday April 6th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & Beautiful. F. sawing. I finished making sap-troughs. Alf went up the Bay to trade his colt. Chattie went with him. Annie Scot & I went to Lodge tonight.

Wednesday April 7th, 1880

W. N.E. till noon – shifted to N.W. Snow squalls till noon – Fine tonight. F & I sawing – sawing clap-boards for Dan. Still Mullen is here tonight.

Thursday April 8th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but windy & cold. We have been making preparations for sugar making, but, as the prospect looked slim we had almost given it up – However this morning F & I concluded to tap trees. So we loaded up a hundred troughs and with Scot (by the way – whose birth-day it is) we drove down below Alf's chopping and there we tapped 30 trees. F carried around the troughs – Scot the "spiles" & I performed the surgical operations. P.M. We took down the molasses hogshead, after taking the molasses out, took down the boilers &c. We fixed up a place to boil.

Friday April 9th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & warmer. F sawing. A.M. Scot & I tapped 70 trees. P.M. We cut up a lot of sap-wood & I gathered tonight 21 pail-fulls.

Saturday April 10th, 1880

W. Southerly – Blowing briskly Fine & warm. F. sawing. Scot & I have boiled sap today. I gathered 50 pail fulls. It has been a real maple sugar day. The dry leaves whirled through the woods, and the robins and the black-birds chirped – It is like many days I have seen in the sunny days of boy-hood which are now hallowed by sweet memories interwoven with fragments of poetry.

Sunday April 11th, 1880

W. Southerly – Warm & very Spring-like. Last night has been rendered a remarkable one by the coming of another little baby – stranger to this world of sin. I went in the "dark & moonless night" through the mud beneath the glittering mid-night stars to summon female assistance. I arroused Mrs Cosman, after which I proceeded to Mrs Wagoner's. Curs – snarling curs, met me at the doors & objected to my entrance. They either did not know the urgency of matter, or, else knowing, they wished to render my embarrasment more rediculous and annoying. The old lady soon got under weigh and we struck up by John Edd's.

She was obliged to take my arm for support. We were walking up the road "big as life" when we met Father and Dan coming with a lantern. Dan brought his "mare" & carriage as far as Charlie's. I have been quite unwell today from my hard work yesterday & being broken of my sleep. Scot & I went over to Bear-Lake tonight for the cattle.

Monday April 12th, 1880

W. N.W. Blowing a gale, and very cold – the sap did not start a drop. I have been boiling sap all day. F. gathered sap this forenoon – 20 pail fulls. W.H.S was here and made me a visit. He came to get some clap-boards. We made 23 ½ lbs of Sugar tonight. Dan was to Weymouth today. Alf got home today – did not trade.

Tuesday April 13th, 1880

W. S.E. Fine, but blowing. I have been boiling sap. F. mending fence. Alf cutting cord— Dan went out with a load. I gathered 9 pails of sap—making just 100 pails so far this spring.

We did not have any Lodge tonight.

Wednesday April 14th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, calm, Beautiful spring day. I have boiled sap again. I gathered 33 pails & F 13.

This morning F. made a little coffin for an infant babe of Peter Wagoner's. This afternoon he helped me in the woods, Alf tapping trees &c. Dan went out. Roxy has got one of the most cunning little babies in the world. We have not named it yet, but talk of different names. It, & its mother are doing well.

Thursday April 15th, 1880

W. S.W. Gentle Breeze – Fine & beautiful. F. sawing. Alf cutting in his piece. Dan heaping and fencing his burnt-land. I have been boiling sap again today. Amanda Hix was washed for Mother last Tuesday. Judson was down where I was boiling sap tonight – He came for the remainder of his sashes. Charlie "Snat" is having a serious time. His wife is badly [bewitched]. They have all sat with closed door for several days.

A new minister has gone in Tusket, by name of Herbert.

Friday April 16th, 1880

W. Westerly. Fine & beautiful. F. sawing. Alf sawing in Wagoner's mill. Dan at his "black falls". I have been boiling sap again. It has not frozen for two or three night & the sap is done unless it freezes again. I boiled down all three is.

We stirred off some this morning, & some again tonight. We have not weighed it yet.

Roxy and her precious little infant are doing well.

Harold played out in the back yard a little while today – the first he has ever been out alone. Isaih went out with our team today.

Saturday April 17th, 1880

W. Easterly – Sleet storm all day – About an inch fallen. A.M. all hands loafing. P.M. Dan hauled two or three logs to the mill. F. went to the mill to saw, but finding the mill full of snow – he helped Dan some, and then came home. I did some repairing in the barn – [mande] a sheet-iron tea-kettle to use at the mill and in the woods – cut some wood &c.

We had not decided till tonight what to call our little baby, but have concluded to name him Leslie Bryant. It & its mother are doing well.

Sunday April 18th, 1880

W. N.E Cloudy & raw – Tonight the wind came to the N.W. and the weather cleared up beautifully. I have stayed in the room with Roxy all day, & read Bunyan. Chattie & Alf were here to tea.

Monday April 19th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and lovely. The snow about all off today. Dan and F. sawing. I went out today with the carriage – taking out my sugar. Scot went with me. My Sugar fell short about 12 lbs. I sold Hoyt 49 3oz I sold Campbells 8 ¼ lbs. I bought Cotty a trout-line and some hooks. I [bout] some sugar, a pair of shoes for Harold the price of which was 70cts. I took Scot to the depot today, and in to the watch makers to see the Electric Battery. Harris Cosman, who had just returned from a visit on the neck, came in with me. I got from the office some letters from St John for Annie, & some cards for Mother & Annie from the States. I mailed a letter with \$1.00 to J.F. Avery and a card to "Fire [Grate]" Pub. Co. F. gathered 20 or 25 pail fulls of sap tonight.

Tuesday April 20th, 1880

W. S. Began raining this morning & continued moderately all day. F & Dan sawing. A.M. I gathered 31 pails of sap. P.M. I turned out the tops of the posts for Harold's little crib. Roxy and her darling little baby Leslie are doing well, for which I am very thankful. "Old Jim Lovitt" died today of the gout.

Wednesday April 21st, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and lovely. F & Dan sawing. When Dan helps F. they saw Dan's logs. Alf went down the River with the colt. He came back again tonight. I've been boiling sap. I gathered 25 pails today. Roxy got out in the room to eat her dinner today. She is getting real smart. Leslie is doing well & Harold is learning to talk.

Thursday April 22nd, 1880

W. S.E. Fine and warm. Looking a little rain tonight. F. sawing. Dan went out with a load for Jos. Porter. He says the cars are running again. Alf cutting in the woods. I have been boiling sap again. I gathered ten pail fulls today.

The sap weather is about done. I have gathered about 257 pail fulls this spring. Roxy got out in the kitchen today. The little one is getting on nicely.

Friday April 23rd, 1880

W. N.W. Glorious weather. I finished boiling my sap today. I got done about two Oclock. Scot & I gathered up the troughs, and hauled up one load but getting up the second & last the "linch-pin" got lost – the wheel came came off, and it being late, I unhitched and left the load. Mr Herbert, a reformed Methodist preacher out at Southville tonight. I was going, but concluded it to be my duty to remain at home with my wife and babies. All the rest went.

Saturday April 24th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine. Froze some last night. F. sawing. Dan and Jim Manzer making fence round the burnt land. I went out with a load – Deals & Boards. Yesterday we made 18 ¾ lbs Sugar. 13 ½ of which I sold to Campbell's today. Altogether we have made upwards of 75lbs. Judson Sabean & I drove out together today. I went down to Journeay's and got three half hides. I brought some letters for Annie & for me a letter from the P.O. Department Ottawa concerning my Petition, & a P. card from a Yankee Washing Machine Co. David Grant & wife came in today.

Sunday April 25th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & warm. We all went to Tusket to meeting but Roxy, Scot, Harold & Leslie. Rev Mr

Rideout preached from the following words: "Simon, Satan desireth to have thee that he may sift thee as wheat, but I have prayed God that thy faith fail not &c. W.H. Sabean & I walked out through the woods. After meeting I took dinner with Stillman Mullen.

In the afternoon we had a sermon again from the words What art thou great Mountain?" &c. After service I came in to W.H.S's, took tea with him, after which we had a sermon in the School-house, by Mr Herbert, from a portion of Revelations – the subject being the glories of Heaven.

Monday April 26th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy till noon, when a drizzling rain commenced which continued till night.

Dan went out with a load – also to look for hay. A.M. I hauled up the last of my sap-troughs – fixed up the cart & hauled down one load of manure. P.M. I worked at the baby's crib. Mr Herbert preached here tonight from the words: "Lay aside every weight & the sin that doth so easily beset us &c. The minister stopped here tonight.

Tuesday April 27th, 1880

W. S.E. – Shifted to N.W. Fog cleared away, and the day became beautiful. I hauled down in the field 8 loads of manure. F. helped me some.

P.M. Dan went to the mill & got a load of lumber. Alf sawing in B.W's mill. D. Grant went home. All hands went out to Southville to meeting tonight, but Roxy, the babies & I.

Wednesday April 28th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine but windy & cold. F & Alonzo Grant began framing Dan's house. Alonzo boards here. Dan went down the River for hay. He got half a ton from A. Jones & B. Haney. I hauled manure. I got down 11 loads. Tonight Alf, Chattie & I went down to Geo. Wagoner's to a Social Meeting.

Thursday April 29th, 1880

W. S.E. Fine – looking like a storm tonight. F. Alonzo, & Dan framing. Alf went out with a load with his colt. I have been hauling manure. I saw a strawberry blossom today. Last Monday we weighed our little baby – it weighed 7 lbs 5 oz.

The precious little thing is getting along nicely

Friday April 30th, 1880

W. S.E. Began raining in the night and continued heavily all day.

I made a pair of shoes for Harold. F. mended Scot's shoe. All of us well – nothing of importance occurred.

Saturday May 1st, 1880

W. N.W. Partly clear – windy & cold. F. D. & Alonzo at the frame. I hauled manure down in the field. Colin Porter & "Jesse" were here to dinner. P.M. Alf went to Tusket & brought in Mr Herbert. Dan & I went out to Southville to social meeting tonight. The minister came in with Alf.

Sunday May 2nd, 1880

W. S.W. Snowed a little this morning, enough to whiten the ground – but soon dissappeared – Cleared up beautifully towards night. This morning we all repaired up to the School-house to hear Mr H---, but Mr Gates spoke instead from the words: "Enter ye in at the straight gate &c".

Geo Wagoner & wife – the minister and Judson took dinner here. P.M. Some went up to Communion W.H.S. & Judson were here all the afternoon & to tea. Lydia was also here to tea. This evening all but Roxy, the babies & I went out to Meeting. The Minister came back with Alf.

Monday May 3rd, 1880

W. Southerly – Fine and warm. F. D & Alonzo framing. Alf fixing fence A.M. I hauled manure down in the field. Shortly after dinner Alf & I were summoned down to help Dan raise his house. There were nine of us, and we got it all up but the rafters. I went to the mill and got the cows. Mr H. had a social meeting here tonight.

Tuesday May 4th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & warm – The grass is getting quite green. Dan went out with his horse and took a load of boards for us. A.M. I took one load of manure down and then hauled off the stones from the potato ground – 7 loads. P.M. F & I plowed up a little piece here in this field to plant early potatoes on. We furrowed it and put out one load of manure. I then went to the mill and brought out 531 ft of Deals to give to the minister. Scot went with and brought the team home. I went on out to meeting to the

S-house – social meeting. At the mill I found the flume bursted, and the water running away fast. I put the planks in and staunched the water quite well. F was out to meeting tonight. Alf harrowed his potato piece.

Wednesday May. 5th, 1880

W. W. Fine and warm. F. at the mill. D. heaping burntland. I have been ploughing, Isiah W. helping me. Alf ploughed his piece with the horses.

Thursday May 6th, 1880

W. S. shifted at noon. Began raining in the night – continued till noon heavily. Dan sawing. A.M. I slept. P.M. F & I hauled some poles to mend the orchard fence and around the lower field. This evening there was meeting up at the School-house – social meeting. F & I went. Alfred Cosman came forward for admission into the Church. Last night at Geo. Wagoners Gussie Prime and Ella Swift presented themselves.

Friday May 7th, 1880

W. N. Fine but cold. AM. Isiah W. and I finished plowing & made some furrows. F. Chattie & Scot went up to Baptism. Mrs Gates & Ellen W. were here to dinner. P.M. We put out two loads of manure on our early potato patch – finishing it, and put out 5 loads down in the field. F planting up here. Dan & Annie went to the Bridge today. Alf went out with his colt and a load.

Saturday May 8th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and warm. I hauled out 12 loads of manure. A.M. F & M went out to see Mr White. He is very sick. Dan at work in his burt-land. Alf at his potato ground. We are all well [not], but me. I have a bad sore throat.

Sunday May 9th, 1880

W. S.E. Rained some in the night. Foggy today. I am quite unwell, having a cold and sore throat. F & M went to Southville to hear Mr Herbert. Mother stopped to Mr White's and Willoughby S—. came in with Father. P.M. I went out to Mr White's too. The old gentleman is very low. I slept a good part of the day. Willoughby had meeting here tonight.

Monday May 10th, 1880

W. S.E. Rained heavily with thunder this morning, but cleared away and the day was delightful. F & M. stayed last night to Mr White's – they came home this morning. Willoughby went away this forenoon. Dan mended his boots. P.M. F. hauled out four loads of manure. Mr White died this afternoon about Six oclk. Chattie and Alf were out there.

Mr Gates and Mr Herbert had a social meeting here tonight. Mr G. & Geo Wagoner stayed here all night. I have done nothing today but write an introduction to a little book of my poems. Scot & I went in the woods tonight for the cattle.

Glorious Spring-Time.

Tuesday May 11th, 1880

W. W. Showery till noon with thunder – cleared off beautifully. I hauled out manure till noon. P.M. I pitched the manure from under the stable. F. cutting up seed. Dan has been making fence. Mr H was here to dinner Mother went out to Mr White's. Alf and Chattie went out to social meeting tonight.

Wednesday May 12th, 1880

W. N.W. Heavy thunder shower this morning – fine till night Delightful growing weather. A.M. I hauled out manure. F & D made "stoop" to the front door. Dan went out and got Mother. P.M. We all but Roxy and her babies went out to Mr White's funeral. THs Rideout preached the sermon in the School-house from Hebrews 6th & 18.

Effe McAlpine came here today to Stop with us. She appears to be a very nice little girl.

Thursday May 13th, 1880

W. N.E. Cloudy, cold & raw. Dan at work in his burntland. I hauled out manure. Alf at his potato patch F. cutting Seed.

Friday May 14th, 1880

W. N.E. Cloudy, cold & raw. Rain hail and snow flying. Dan went to Weymouth. Alf at his potatoes. I hauled out manure. P.M. F began planting down in the field. Revds Messers Herbert & Gates held a social meeting here tonight.

Saturday May 15th, 1880

W. N. Fine but windy & raw. I finished hauling out manure. I have put 46 loads out for potatoes down below and 3 up here. I hauled down 47 loads before, making 93 loads I've hauled this Spring. F planting Dan at his black "falls". Alf, Chattie & Mr Herbert went down the River today.

Sunday May 16th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy till towards night when it cleared up beautifully. F. went to Tusket to meeting. Roxy & I read &c. This afternoon we took a stroll down where I made Sugar this spring

Monday May 17th, 1880

W. W. Cloudy & with a few showers Fine tonight. F & I planted potatoes. D at his burnt-land. Alf at his potatoes. Social Meeting here again tonight Annie Willoughby began her School here today.

Tuesday May 18th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and glorious. We finished planting tonight. This forenoon Effe and Scot dropped – P.M. Scot dropped alone – He worked well. Mr Herbert went out the Settlement today. I went up the road tonight to have "Club" – alone came but a few children. Dan went out with a load today. Alf at his potatoes.

Wednesday May 19th, 1880

W. Southerly. Weather delightful. I hauled two loads of poles to mend the fence around the Spring field. This afternoon F & I mending fence. Dan has been heaping burnt-land. Alf at his potatoes. Aunt Lydia & [Fred] spent the day here.

Thursday May 20th, 1880

W. S.W. Cloudy & dull. F. mending fence. A.M. Dan helped Alf finish his planting. P.M. Alf helped D. in his burnt-land. I have been very unwell today P.M. I finished our baby crib. Mr H. who has been away since Sunday came back tonight.

Friday May 21st, 1880

W. W. Fine & beautiful. Alf helping D. in his burnt-land. A.M. F. mending fence. Mr H & I went down back of the orchard this forenoon where we held a long discourse. P.M. F. mended the minister's boots. I fixed fence down along the orchard.

The cherry trees are showing some blossoms. The woods look a little green, and all nature smiling.

Saturday May 22nd, 1880

W. S.W. Foggy & dull. Alf went out for us with Dan's "mare" and got a bbl of flour. F. helping D in his B-land. I am in a low state of health. – can scarcely "navigate". Today I layed a little floor in the shop to put my saptroughs on. I digged some in the garden and made some rows for vegetables – been busy all day Harold was taken ill tonight of a dreadful cold. Mother too, has not been well for some days.

Tonight Mr Herbert induced us to change our baby's name from L. Bryant to L. Herbert.

Sunday May 23rd, 1880

W. S.W. Partly fine – very warm. F. Mr H. & I went out to Southville this morning to hear Mr Gates. I got my dinner at Mr Whites & then came home. F & the Minister went to W.H.S's to dinner and after Social Meeting came in accompanied by W.H.S. We had Social Meeting here tonight. Harold is quite sick.

Monday May 24th, 1880

W. W. Rained a little in the night Foggy till noon – then cleared off very fine. F. D. and Alf mending fence I went to Tusket today – over to Uncle George's with the carriage & Dan's 'Mare', and got seven bushels of Oats – five for Dan and two for us. I paid for D's -- \$3.00. I went across by Hill town, and came around. This is Social meeting up the road tonight. I did not get home in time to go, but all the rest but Annie, Rox, and the babies went.

Tuesday May 25th, 1880

W. N. Fine and cool. A.M. Dan hauled out two loads from the mill. F & I made some brush fence in the swamp. P.M. I made some squash hills planted a lot of apple trees &c. I also went to the mill and got a load of fence-boards for Alf. At the mill I split some boards and

slabs for a fence around the garden. Dan at his burntland. F & Alf hewing fence post. Harold's cold seems to be a little better tonight. Mr H. went down to Mr Gate's today.

Wednesday May 26th, 1880

W. N W. Fine and beautiful. F. sheared the sheep. A.M. I helped Alf haul up some fence post. I helped mother down in the garden &c. Alf & I had a swim, the first time I have been in this spring. Dan went out with a load. P.M. I picked up stones down in the field. It is a lovely day.

Harold is most well again. Alf went to the mill this afternoon and got the big saw to cut up his posts.

Thursday May 27th, 1880

W. W. Glorious weather – All Nature in her robes of the most superb loveliness. F. helped Alf saw up his fence posts after which they sawed a couple of shingle logs Dan began planting in burnt-land. I have been picking up stones. Mr Herbert came back tonight. Mr Cereno Jones of Weymouth died on last Sunday after a very short illness. I am quite unwell these few days. Harold is getting most well

Friday May 28th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine again. F helping Alf make board-fence. A.M. D. shoed his horse. P.M. he cleaned the harness &c. All I have done today was to mend the carriage shaft. Mr H. went to Weymouth today. I went out to Social meeting tonight, & he came home with me.

Saturday May 29th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, breezy & pleasant. Dan and Annie went up the Bay. Mr Herbert bid us farewell this morning, and started for St. John. It was very sad to see him go, but the time of parting must come sooner or later.

A.M. F sowed oats in the Blin burnt land where we last year had buckwheat & turnips, & I harrowed them in. P.M. F & I started to go back to Seven-pence-hapenny Lake, but I after going down to the lake concluded I was unable to go further, so returned. My health is very poor. Alf went down to French-town today and got some fish for us from Jasper White. Scot went with him.

Sunday May 30th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine, but smoky as to darken the sky. Enock Mullen has a terrible fire raging back on the burnt, & there are heavy forest fires in every direction. Tonight it has begun to rain a little but the sky is so full of smoke that I cannot tell whether there will be much rain or not – but a rain is greatly needed. This forenoon we had a little Sunday School over at Alf's. I am very unwell today.

Monday May 31st, 1880

W. S. Rained all night and all day, by times quite heavily. I have spent the day in my room writing. F doing nothing Alf made a pair of Shoes today for Chattie. They are very good indeed. My health is very poor yet – I don't know how long before I shall get out to work again.

Tuesday June 1st, 1880

W. N.W. Glorious – The apple trees are in full bloom, and all nature delightful.

F. Sawing. Alf making fence – board fence. Dan & Annie came home tonight. Roxy got a letter from her Mother. I have been writing all day. I wrote two letters – To the "B.A.B & T Society" & to Dr Rickard – "Wesleyan Book Room." Tonight I went down in the wood and got some moss. Mother's health is quite poor.

Harold's cough is most well.

Little Leslie fell off of Effie's lap yesterday, and we thought got most killed, but fortunately he received no injuries beyond some bruises. He is real well, and grows like a weed.

Wednesday June 2nd, 1880

W. N.W. Showery all day – Grand for the grass. F. sawing. Alf making a gate. A.M. Dan planting. P.M. He went to the mill and hauled out lumber. I put new quarters in one of my old shoes. I let Peter Wagoner have 4 bushels of Potatoes. Chattie had a picking party today. I am feeling some better.

Thursday June 3rd, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and lovely – A cool breeze blew all day. F. sawing. Dan planting in his burnt-land. Alf & I, having decided to Join Blin in clearing up a piece of burntland, we made a begining to day at the fence. This

morning Alf & I hauled a load of poles and mended the fence around the C—no field. I am not able to work, but must try and do what I can.

Friday June 4th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine again. F & I hauled out six loads of manure and planted the beans & corn. Alf planted his beans today. D. planting

Saturday June 5th, 1880

W. N.W. Gloriously Beautiful. Apple-trees in full bloom. Alf & I Blin Jim Cosman and Will Cosman with Jim's, Will's & our oxen have been making burnt-land fence. F. helping. D. plant in his burnt-land. Chattie & Annie Willoughby went down the River today.

Sunday June 6th, 1880

W. N.W. Gloriously fine. This has been a real old fashioned Summer Sunday. We have all been home all day.

Chattie & Annie Willoughby came back. I have read & slept all day.

Monday June 7th, 1880

W. W. Fine & beautiful. D. planting. A.M. F. mending fence. P.M. F. Sawing. We have been heaping today – with our oxen. Mother is very "poorly" now – scarcely able to get around. Babies quite well

Tuesday June 8th, 1880

W. S.W. Foggy, but cleared off beautifully. F. sawing. Dan at his burnt-land. Alf went over to Tusket to look for buckwheat for our burnt-land. He bought 2 bushels – one from H. Sabean for 80cts – one from J McAlpine for \$1.00. Blin, Jim & I heaping with Jim's oxen. We found a few ripe Straw-berries

Wednesday June 9th, 1880

W. Variable – Fine & warm. Alf & Chattie went out to the carding-mill. Alf expected to get old David's oxen, but did not. There was a "promenade concert" at Weymouth today. Blin, Jim, F. & I heaping with Blin's oxen. Mother had a "Picking party today.

Thursday June 10th, 1880

Wind variable – Cloudless & warm. Blin & Jim, F, A, & I heaping burnt-land. Dan in his burnt-land. We had our oxen there this afternoon. I picked a handful of strawberries today for Harold. Both of our babies are well. Little Leslie is growing up with the flowers.

Friday June 11th, 1880

Wind variable. Fine & very warm. Looking like rain tonight. We finished heaping today and sat all our heaps on fire tonight. We have got a splendid burnt-land.

Saturday June 12th, 1880

W. W. Foggy – misty till noon – then cleared off beautifully. It is very dry now and vegetation is suffering. A.M. Blin, Jim, Alf & I chunked up our heaps. I am not well today. P.M. Blin, Jim, & Alf making fence I made a handle for my razor, had my hair cut &c. Roxy & I went down in the woods and got some moss. We took Harold down to the lake with us. It is the first he has ever been there. On our way home I showed Harold a ripe Strawberry. He got down & with his little chubby fingers picked it and put it in his mouth. It is the first strawberry he has ever picked. If at any future day he should read these lines he can know the exact date of his first visit to the beautiful shore of Provost Lake, and also that of his first experience in picking strawberries, -- a past time so delightful to his "Papa".

"Old David" brought in a pair of oxen today which father has bought. Willoughby was here today.

Dan went out with a load.

I got a letter tonight from Mr Herbert. I had some potatoes today.

Sunday June 13th, 1880

Wind W. Fine. F & Roxy went out this morning to hear Willoughby. They walked. W---y is not very well, so he did not preach tonight. I have been sick all day. F. W. &c went up the road this afternoon to hear Mr Gates. Janey Cosman is here tonight, and all hands are singing.

Monday June 14th, 1880

W. E. Cloudy & cold. F. took the oxen over to the Alride farm. Dan & Mother went to the Carding mill. Alf making burnt land fence. I am not well & have done nothing but hoe a few potatoes and write a letter to Mr Herbert.

Tuesday June 15th, 1880

W. North. Clear delightful, and cool. A fortnight has passed since we have had any rain.

The grass is suffering for rain, & if none comes soon, the hay-crop will be slim. Dan has been making board fence in front of his house. A.M. F. fixing fence. Alf hung a gate. I have been looking for harrow crutches. I found two or three. P.M. Alf, Blin, Jim and I finished our burntland fence. F looking for Harrow crutches I got strawberries enough for Harold's Tea tonight

Wednesday June 16th, 1880

W. N.E. Clear and lovely.

A.M. I helped Dan make a board-fence in front of his house. Alf put a latch on his gate.

P.M. F. A. & I working in the B.S. Shop at harrow-teeth &c. Annie took Dan down the River to work on one of Campbell's old vessels.

Father and Mother are not very well.

Thursday June 17th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine. F. A. & I making harrow irons, & fixing up the harrow. We got it done tonight. This Afternoon Alf & I each hauled up a load of swamp mud. I put my load in the pig yard. Annie & Roxy were up to Sarah's vising with Harold & Leslie. It is the first time Leslie has been anywhere excepting to Chatties's.

Friday June 18th, 1880

W. W. Fine. There is some appearance that there will be rain soon, and it is needed badly. Today F. Alf & I have been in our burnt-land putting in buck wheat, oats and turnips. F sowing, Alf harrowing, and I hacking.

Saturday June 19th, 1880

W. S.W. Cloudless – F. sawing. Alf & I harrowing and hacking B-land. We thought to have finished tonight but did not. Tonight he and I went to the lake and had a wash.

Annie & Scot went out tonight to visit Dan.

Sunday June 20th, 1880

W. S & S.W. Fine and the wind blowing considerably. Nothing of note occurred. I have been reading in Bunyan all day (mostly) This afternoon Roxy & I took a walk down to the burnt-land.

Monday June 21st, 1880

W. S. Foggy this morning. Cleared up, and fine till about Sunset when a thunder storm came up. It is now raining beautifully. F. sawing. (A.M.) Alf finished harrowing the burnt-land. I did not get quite done hacking at noon. (P.M.) Alf took a load of logs up to Wagoner's Mill, and brought home a load of deals. I helped him load his logs. I made some rows to plant tomatoes in, and tonight I finished hacking the burnt-land, and planted there some cucumbers. Dan went out to C. C.s again today to work. Will Cosman went with him to bring the horse back. Henry Lewis was here today and bargained for our old oxen.

Little Leslie is quite unwell today but I am in hopes that he will soon be well again. Harold is well now. He has "traw-beddies" (straw berries) for every meal. I pick them for him, and if we both live he may some day pick some for his "pappa", as he calls him

Tuesday June 22nd, 1880

W. S.W. Shifted to North. Foggy til noon then cleared off. A little rain came through the night. F & I have been to the mill today. We edged two loads of boards. Alf has been pedaling around.

Wednesday June 23, 1880

W. N.E. Cloudy, cold & misty all day. F & I to the mill sawing. Alf started to go out with a load of cord-wood for himself, but on the road he got his cart broke-down so he returned, & he & Chattie went out with the carriage. Annie Willoughby & Will Cosman were here to tea tonight.

Thursday June 24th, 1880

W. W. Fine. F & I sowed buck-wheat & turnips in Dan's burnt land and Alf harrowed. F [illegible] got done a little before night and came home. Then F. yoked the oxen and hauled home sticks [illegible] a tongue and axel-tree for the cart. Roxy and I went down in Will's field, and each picked a bowl of berries.

Friday June 25th, 1880

W. S. Fine and warm – looking tonight like rain. F. has been making a cart–axel & tongue. Alf has been harrowing D's burnt-land. I hauled out two loads of Deals from the mill (1600 ft) and brought a load of boards home for floor for the shop.

Saturday June 26th, 1880

W. S.E. Till afternoon then shifted to W. From early morning to the middle of the afternoon there were heavy showers of rain with thunder. I was going out today with two loads, but the storm prevented. This forenoon I got ready to go out and when the storm began, I went to the b.S.Shop & made an iron holder to go on the Work bench. P.M. I went down to the corner & piled up some lumber and then brought the oxen home from the little field. I then cut Will C's & Dan's hair, and picked a cup of strawberries. F. has been working at his tongue & axel. Dan came home tonight I got a Postal card from Dr Pickard. Little Hal is sick tonight. He seems to have a high fever, but we are in hopes he will not be very sick.

Sunday June 27th, 1880

Wind N.W. A most glorious day. All of us home. Obed White was here to dinner. This afternoon Alf, Chattie & Annie Willoughby went out to Church – the parson was not there. I read a sermon or two today, and wrote a Psalm. But I have spent the day in a manner that I am ashamed of tonight. Little Harold is better today

Monday June 28th, 1880

W. S. Fine and very fine warm. Scot & I went to Weymouth today with two loads of deals with the oxen & Dan's horse. We took out 1628 ft. I got a barrel of flour. Alf is hoeing his potatoes A.M. F finished fixing up the cart P.M. He went to the mill. Dan has been harrowing his burnt-land.

Tuesday June 29th, 1880

W. S. Foggy this morning, but cleared off beautiful – very warm. We began hoing today. F & D. ploughed out a few rows this morning, then F & I hoed till noon and D. went down & finished harrowing his burnt-land. P.M. D. helped plough out a few more rows. He has been fixing up a cord-wood cart body. I have been hoing. Alf is

working at his potatoes. F. helped him plough them out this morning. I am not very well tonight.

Wednesday June 30th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine & warm. A shower of rain came up this afternoon & for a few minutes the rain came down terribly, but soon passed away and the weather cleared off beautifully. F & I have both been at the potatoes. Dan & I finished ploughing out the potatoes this afternoon. This forenoon Dan finished harrowing his burnt-land. F & I are both sick today from drinking buttermilk. Alf finished hoing potatoes today and hauled down some lumber from Wagoner's mill.

Thursday July 1st, 1880

W. S.W. Beautiful and fine. Pic-Nic Day! A.M. Alf & I "stogged" our burnt-land fence. F went down and fixed Dan's burnt-land fence. Roxy went out to Weymouth this morning and took Dan out to the Station on his way to St. John. Towards noon Eth Ring and Hit came. Through the afternoon a few more came, and I suppose they had a good time. I have been sick all day So I have not enjoyed myself much. Eth & Hit stayed all night. Mrs Wm Payson buried today

Friday July 2nd, 1880

W. S. Cloudy – Showery tonight. F & I have been hoing today. Eth helped us this afternoon. Alf went out with a load of Deals.

Saturday July 3rd, 1880

W. E & N. Cloudy all day. A.M. F. Eth and I finished hoing. P.M. F & I prepared a place and planted some cabbage. Eth harnessed his horse and took F out to Mr White's to get some plants. Alf has been working some in the b.S.Shop

Sunday July 4th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine all day.

All hands home. Ethel and Hittie went home this afternoon.

Little Harold is quite sick today Alf, Chattie & Annie Willoughby went down the River this afternoon – came home some time in the night

Monday July 5th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. Alf, who is road-master this season, began the road work today. F. on the Road. I hoed the beans today. Isiah W. went out with D's horse for Dan. Harold is better today.

We looked for Dan home tonight but he did not come

Tuesday July 6th, 1880

W. S. Cloudy till about noon, then began to rain and continued moderately till night. A.M. Alf & I on the road. F. sawing sawing all day. P.M. I fixed Roxy's slipper, and began to make me another shoe. Tonight Alf & I went out to Mr Whites for cabbage plants. We found F. there who had gone for the same errand – he came in with us. Little Harold is well as ever, any further than his appetite, which has not returned. At present I am not able to work – but I keep I keep around.

Wednesday July 7th, 1880

W. S. but shifted to N.W. Rained a little this morning, the foggy till tonight – when it cleared off beautifully. I finished my shoes, and tonight went to the mill and got a load of Deals. F. Sawing. P.M. Alf working on the road.

Thursday July 8th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and very warm. I went to Weymouth with D's mare. I took out between 4 & 5 hundred ft. I started early so as to get Dan's trunk on board the train. I got five gallons of molasses also a pair of Prunella boots for Roxy, the price of which was \$1.90. I got a letter for Roxy from her mother. Alf finished on the road today. A.M. F fixed Dan's fence then finished the day in sawing. I am in a very low State of health.

Friday July 9th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine till towards when it clouded up & is looking like rain. F. sawing. Alf went out with a load of wood for himself. I have been around home. I hewed out a stick for a dutch yoke. I layed Some floor in the work shop &c.

Little Leslie is sick today, though we hope not seriously. Isiah went out for Dan with the Mare.

Saturday July 10th, 1880

W. W. Foggy this morning, but soon cleared off beautifully. F. sawing. Alf began mowing in my field. He mowed about half of the field. I fell this morning in a pile of cordwood in the road & nearly killed myself. I am so lame I can scarcely move. Old David & wife came in today. I got a letter tonight from Mr Herbert. Delighted to hear from him. We got some medicine tonight for Leslie.

Sunday July 11th, 1880

W. W. Beautifully fine. F & M went out to hear Willoughby. He came in with them. We had Sunday School here tonight. I am so lame today that I can scarcely move. I have read a couple of Spurgeon's sermons.

Monday July 12, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. F & Alf are mowing today. [Then] finished & raking my little field & mowed Some in the orchard. I have done nothing today, but write a letter to Mr Herbert & scribble some verses. Little Leslie was better all day yesterday, but this morning he is worse again and Roxy gave him another powder. I was so in hopes that the little fellow was getting most well, but Still I am in hopes that he is not [dangerous] Old David & wife went home today

Tuesday July 13th, 1880

W. S. Cloudy – Began raining about noon – continued till night. A.M. F went to to the mill & counted some lumber belonging to Jos Porter. Alf & I got in a load of hay from my little orchard P.M. F mowing in the orchard, Alf making a fork handle. I spent an hour or two in laying floor in the Shop. Little Leslie is getting quite smart again. My lame Side is very bad yet. I fear I am going to have a long seige of it.

Wednesday July 14th, 1880

W. N.E. Fine – windy & cool. F & A. mowing & raking in the orchard. This afternoon I turned over some hay down in the little orchard, and helped F. & A rake some. Ben Mullen brought a cow today that F. bought from him. His price is twenty dollars. My lameness is a little better, but am in a very poor condition. We mailed a letter

today to Mr Herbert. Isaih went out today with D's mare.

Thursday July 15th, 1880

W. S.W. Beautifully fine. A.M. F went out to David Porter's raising – raising a barn. I worked in the hay all the forenoon, opening & spreading. I hauld Some water this morning and a load of wood. P.M. F & I finished raking up the little orchard and raked some in the orchard. Alf has been sick all day. Isiah [went] out with Dan's Oxen. I am very sick today – pretty near dead.

Friday July 16th, 1880

W. S.W. Looked very much like rain. This morning bright and early we went hauling in hay. We got one load out of the Blin field and two from the orchard. F & A mowed the rest of the day finishing the orchard. This afternoon Roxy, the babies & I went over to Uncle George's cherrying We found plenty & had a good time. It is the first time either of our babies were to Tusket.

Saturday July 17th, 1880

W. S. Rained some in the night & a severe thunder shower came up about the middle of the day, lasting a couple of hours. We came home this afternoon. Effe McAlpine went out with us as far as her home with us & came back again today.

F. has been mowing some [today]. Alf, Chattie & Annie W. went down the River tonight. I see by the "Courier" that Dr Smith of Digby is dead.

Sunday July 18th, 1880

W. W. Gloriously fine. Mother went out to Mr Whites this morning – walked – father went out tonight. Annie Roxy & I have, with our babies, been home all day. I slept all the forenoon and this afternoon I have spent in reading Bunyan. Alf came home tonight. Charlie Campbell & Lib Rice were married one day last week.

Monday July 19th, 1880

W. Variable – Fine. A.M. F & I mowed in the Cerino field. P.M. We finished raking in the orchard & hauled it in – two loads. Henry Cornwell gave us a call this afternoon. Isiah went out for Dan with his mare. Very warm today.

Tuesday July 20th, 1880

W. variable. Fine & quite warm. A.M. F. A. & I began mowing on the hill. We mowed awhile & then went down and raked a little in the C. field. P.M. We finished raking the C-field & hauled it in – had not over five or six hundred. So poor we do not think to mow it again. Uncle Alfred & Aunt Eleanor came this forenoon. We were delighted to See them. I am very poorly.

Wednesday July 21st, 1880

W. S. Foggy till noon with a few slight showers, then cleared away. It has been an extremely hot day. Uncle Alf went home this afternoon. Still Mullen was here a little while. A.M. I bored some sticks for a rick-gate. F. finished it. P.M. F & A mowing. I have been loafing. I am in a very bad state of health. A bear was seen yesterday in Dan's burnt land.

Thursday July 22nd, 1880

W. S.W. Foggy – or rather cloudy all day & excessively sultry. AM. F. A. & I mowed down on the hill. P.M. F. mending his boots. Alf – doing nothing I guess. I layed some floor in the Shop. Isaih went out with D's mare & wood.

Friday July 23rd, 1880

W. S. Rained some in the night and showery till noon – foggy till night. A.M. F. asleep. Alf doing nothing. I finished laying the shop floor. P.M. F & A mowing in the rough field by the road. I raked behind them. Scot helped me. Mother & Roxy finished spinning. I had raspberries for my dinner – the first.

Saturday, July 24th, 1880

W. S.W. Rained till noon – foggy till night – then cleared away.

A.M. I slept. F & A doing nothing PM. A. doing nothing. F & I went to the mill & brought home a load of deal ends for fire wood.

Alf went down the River tonight

Sunday July 25th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine and pleasant.

P.M. F. went up to hear Mr Greenlau who has been in the

place a few days. We have spent the day in reading &c. We had new potatoes today for the first of the Season.

Monday, July 26th, 1880

W. S.W. Cloudy till noon, then there came a shower of rain after-wich it cleared away beautifully. Horrid hay weather! This morning I began to build a work-bench after which F & I raked up some hay in the rough field. Alf got a load of lumber from Wagoner's mill. P.M. I worked awhile at my bench F & I then raked some hay down on the hill. Alf hauled some lumber from our mill. Mr Greenlau made us a call this afternoon. Isiah went out with the mare today.

Tuesday July 27th, 1880

W S. Foggy all day. F. mowing in the rough field. Alf & I went out with each a load for Hoyt. I took 1011 ft of spruce 80 ft of which were refuse, & the refuse were among boards Blin returned which he had borrowed – 70 ft were of Blin boards. The load was for father. I got a pocket-knife for Father.

There was a great "Yarmouth picnic" to Weymouth today. I brought Annie a letter tonight from Dan He is not coming home yet Within the the past week there have been two Weddings -- Jim Barr & Geo. Nowlan. Mother spent the day at W.H.S's.

Wednesday July 28th, 1880

W. W. Foggy till noon but cleared off. We mowed some in the rough ground this morning, then spread hay till noon. P.M. We raked up a lot, and got in two loads off of the hill.

Thursday July 29th, 1880

W. N. Beautifully fine. Heavy banks of Clouds lying around tonight & has some appearance of rain. A.M. We mowed down on the hill. This morning Alf & I, accompanied by one of our of our four-footed barn-yard friends, which seemed to be somewhat excited, repaired to the pasture lot of our neighbour B. Wagoner where we found one of the occupants delighted to see us. P.M. We raked what we mowed down on the hill, & some in the rough field. We then hauled it all in – two loads. Effe McAlpine went home on a visit.

Friday July 30th, 1880

W. S.W. Showery till noon then cleared up. Heavy thunder Clouds lying around. A.M. F. mended mother's shoe. P.M. F, A. & I. mowing down in the rough field.

Saturday July 31st, 1880

W. N.W. Fine. A.M. F. A. & I finished mowing the rough field P.M. We raked it all up.

Sunday Aug 1st, 1880

W. S.W. Beautiful. Alf went down the River this morning after Chattie. Mother went with him. Nothing of Note Occurred. This evening F & I went up to hear Mr Ford. Text – Nehemiah IV & 6 "So built we the wall, & all the wall was joined together unto the half thereof, for the people had a mind to work"

Monday Aug 2nd, 1880

W. S.W. Fine – blowing heavily this afternoon & night.

Geo. Sabean helped us in our hay today. We mowed down all this level field on this side of the road and got part of it raked. Looks some like rain tonight. Harold fell out of the shop window today but hardly did not get hurt much.

Tuesday Aug 3rd, 1880

W. S. Cloudy till noon – Began raining continued drizzling till night. Hauled in two loads of hay – one from the rough field (the last) one from this field to the W of the house – being all from there.

While I was loading the hay in the rough field this morning I was taken sick at the stomach – so much so that I was obliged to come home and go to bed – where I remained the greater part of the day. Tonight I began getting out some Stuff for W. Bench drawers. F & A raked most all the field by the W. house

Wednesday Aug 4th, 1880

W. S. Drizzling rain all day.

A.M. Alf went out to Mrs Randall's and brought Mother home. F. mowed a little. I have been very "poorly", but I plained out some more drawer Stuff. P.M. F & A tinkering around. I went to the mill and got a load to go out with tomorrow. Isaih went out with Dan's mare.

Dan came home tonight from St. John. We were all glad to See him. He paid me \$13.00 tonight He brought Scot & Harold each a rubber ball. H's ball cost 9 cts.

Thursday Aug 5th, 1880

W. N. Rained heavily during the night & continued drizzling till this afternoon then cleared away. A.M. F. reading "Histories Of All Religions". Alf picking up horse shoes for Will Cosman. I have been working at my Work-bench all day. P.M. Dan went to the mill & got out a load of lumber. F & A went blue-berrying – They got a few.

Friday Aug 6th, 1880

W. W. Fine F. A. & Dan haying. I went to Weymouth with a load of boards to Hoyt as follows Pine 735 S 288 Ref 26 --- 1049 I got a Bbl of flour from Hoyt – price 8.25 I got some mote paper – a shirt front -- & a little [acp] book for Roxy. Judson accompanied me.

Saturday Aug 7th, 1880

W. N.W. Beautiful & lovely.

F. D. A. & I mowed Blins acre field, raked it & hauled it in. We also hauled a load out of this field (being the last) and a load out of the hill field. Mrs Ring & Eth came this forenoon. Eth. helped us haul in hay. Isiah went today for Dan.

I see in today's paper that Lyman Peters is married – to a Miss Powell.

Sunday Aug 8th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. F. went out to hear Willoughby. Dan & Eth went up to hear Mr Greenlau. Willoughby & W.H.S. were here to tea.

Willoughby preached tonight from Psalms 1-6 "My Cup runneth over." Mother & Mrs Ring went up to "Communion this afternoon. Eth went home this afternoon.

Monday Aug 9th, 1880

W. S. Partly fine. Dan & Isiah went out each with a load. Alf went off this morning with the horse & carriage – I calculate on a horse trade. This forenoon F & I got up the sheep & butchered one. P.M. F & I went to the mill & mowed part of the meadow below the mill. Mrs Ring,

Roxy & Leslie were up to B. Wagoner's this afternoon visiting.

Tuesday Aug 10th, 1880

W. S.W. Foggy till towards night when it partly cleared off. F went to the mill meadow and finished mowing it. Alf & I began mowing the Spring-field. F came towards night & mowed a little & raked some. Dan has been all day cutting & getting home a shingle log. Mother & Mrs Ring have been visiting at Mrs. Wagoner's.

Wednesday Aug 11th, 1880

W. W. Rained some in the night. Foggy till noon, then cleared off. Looks tonight like fine weather. A.M. F. D. A & I mowed in the spring field. Mr Geo. Dunbar came here to see father. P.M. We finished mowing the S. field and raked a little of it. Ditmars Dunbar was here to dinner. He is collecting poor rates. F. paid him \$2.03. I paid him 10cts.

Mother & Mrs Ring were up to Charley's.

Thursday Aug 12th, 1880

W. N. Fine. Heavy thunder-clouds all around the S & S.E. F. went to the mill-meadow this morning to work at the hay. Alf, Dan & I began mowing in our Blin two-acre field. We also spread a lot of hay in the S-field. P.M. Alf, Dan, and the little boys – Scot & Roll – went to the mill with the team for the hay – They got about ¾ of a ton. I raked alone in the S-field. I raked 25 bunches; but not much grass grew beneath my feet. Lydia was here visiting today.

Friday Aug 13th, 1880

W. S.W. Beautifully fine. A.M. all hands mowing bushes in the Blin field. P.M. We hauled the hay out of the S-field – 3 loads. Dan raked a little in the B. field. Jim Manzer was here to tea tonight. Isiah was out for Dan today. He brought in D's nails & glass. Mother & Mrs Ring were out to Aunt Sarah's visiting. Our babies (in fact all hands – have had bad colds, but are getting better.

Saturday Aug 14th, 1880

W. S. Fine this morning – but clouded up and rained most all the afternoon Dan went to Weymouth with his oxen

& a load of wood, & went out to see about his things from St. Johns. F & A - I guess are working some in the hay today.

At 10 A.M. Roxy & I with our babies and Mrs Ring started for up the Bay. After a Seven hour Seige with Dan's lazy old mare, we arrived at Mrs Ring's at 5 P.M. We did not get wet through. Mr Morton passed us at Plympton with his carriage, and Roxy with her babies got on board of his team and went on out of the rain and arived one hour in our advance. Our babies are about well now but they cough some still. We found them all well. I lent Mr Blin \$2.00 this morning. Effe went home today for good. The Marquis of Lorne – Governor General of Canada – passed through these counties this week.

Sunday Aug 15th, 1880

W. W. Fine. Nothing of note occurred today. Eth & I went down to the shore for a walk, visiting "The Money Hole". Tonight Roxy & I went up to hear Mr Parker. Text 1 Cor. 16 & 22 "If any man love not the lord Jesus Christ let him be Anathema Maranatha."
The sermon was a very good one, and subject such as should arouse to serious meditation the most thoughtless.

Monday Aug 16th, 1880

W. Westerly. Fine & beautiful – windy. This morning Roxy & her babies together with Mrs Ring & Hit went up to "Gama Saxon's" & spent the day Eth & I went out and had a sail. P.M. Eth, Johnny Dunkley & I went over under the "Red Head" to mackerel fish. We caught a few. I got about a half dozen. I was quite sea-sick. Tonight after tea Roxy & I went up to Uncle John's a little while. F. D. & A finished haying today.

Tuesday Aug 17th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. A.M. Eth. Johnny D. & I with Roxy, went out to fish again. We did not get any. After dinner We started for home. Cornelia Ring came with us. We stopped at Mrs Randalls a little while to feed Leslie. There was another grand Yarmouth Pic Nic at Weymouth today. I got some sugar & a broom. Dan helped W.H.S in his hay today. F. has been very sick while we have been gone. We got home about Sundown.

Wednesday Aug 18th, 1880

W. W. Fine. Alf & Chattie went out last night & came in this morning, bringing Annie Willoughby who began her school again this morning. Dan chopped down to the corner today. A.M. I hauled some water there F & I hauled five drags of wood. P.M. I helped Alf plow a road to haul cord wood on, After which F & I peeled some hemlock down here where we get wood. This evening Cornelia & I went up to the "Sand Bed" and brought the boat up to our landing

Thursday Aug 19th, 1880

W. S. Fine. We began working on the road here on the swamp. F. D. Al & I. F. is quite unwell.

Friday Aug 20th, 1880

W. S. Began raining in the night and continued all day by times, heavily. Dan has got a lame back. He began making shingles today. F helped him this afternoon. Alf made an axe-handle. I have been working on my workbench drawers – putting rollers in.

Saturday Aug 21st, 1880

W. S. Foggy till noon – then began raining – continued till night. Father is half sick, and Dan has got a lame back. I have been working in the Shop all day F. has been making shingles for Dan. Dan doing nothing. We heard today that Albert Graham has just died.

Sunday August 22nd, 1880

W. N.W. Foggy till about 9 oclk then cleared off, and the day has been beautiful. Mother was taken sick in the night & has been very sick all day. Father is getting better & Dan is too.

A.M. Cornelia & I went up to hear Mr G. He spoke from 1 Samuel 15 & 22nd. P.M. Cornelia & I went up to Communion W.H. Sabean came home with us to tea. I went down to the Corner with him tonight.

Monday Aug 23rd, 1880

W. N.W. Beautifully fine – warm. F. A. D & I working on the road. A.M. We hauled gravel on the swamp. P.M. We fixed a little Cross-way by Como's. Mother is better today. She sat up this afternoon

Tuesday Aug 24th, 1880

W. W. Beautiful Day. A.M. F. D. Will Cosman & I sawed up D's shingle log. Then Alf & I went to the lake and had a swim, afterwhich F & I peeled hemlock bark till noon. Mr Greenlau was here to dinner. P.M. F & I finished peeling bark. I mended my shoes. Alf has been cutting cord-wood &c. Dan went to the mill and got a load of boards. Tonight he is fixing up a cord-wood "body". Mother is still getting better.

Wednesday Aug 25th, 1880

W. N. Rained a little in the night and this morning, then cleared away beautifully. F. making shingles for Dan. Dan chopping on his piece. Alf finished his road and I think started up some wood. Will Cos. & I started at 10 a.m. for our Meadow. We crossed at the foot of the "Seven pen hapenny" lake went up back of the lake between it & the Sand Lake & thence to Long Tusket which we crossed on a raft and about Sundown we got on our camping-ground - a pretty little beech knoll on the lake shore. We made us a little bush camp - made us a blazing fire and were soon as comfortable and happy as possible. I will never forget that night. It seemed the prettiest little spot in the world. The setting sun made a silver path across the rippling lake - the moon rose up out of the eastern forest & looked down from a cloudless sky & a million stars peeped down through the leafy tree-tops & now & then from some gloomy nook an owl would make the timid heart quiver by its dismal hoot.

Thursday Aug 26th, 1880

W. W. Glorious day. Will & I put in a very comfortable night, & this morning we did not like to leave our cozy little home; but duty urged, so having eaten a hearty breakfast we started for our meadow which we followed up to the head and from there to the next dam above. After cruising around a while we came back to our little camp where we we ate a "bite", embarked again for the west. after crossing the lake we struck through to the "big bog" & from thence to Oak lake & soon home. We got home about Sun Set. Mother is getting most well again. F. has been making shingles for Dan &c. Dan chopping. Lawyer Morse inspected the School today & is at Alf's tonight.

Friday Aug 27th, 1880

W. variable – Fine. Dan chopping. Alf went out with a load of wood for himself. A.M. F & I working around generally. P.M. We hewed a stick of ton timber down here in the woods. Tonight Cornelia Ring & I went over to our burnt-land – got some cucumbers & some green corn on our route

Saturday Aug 28th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. F cleaned out the cellar & shaved shingles for Dan. I worked for W.H.S—in the road out by Cereno's. Dan was out with his mare and a load of wood. Douglas Campbell was married a few days ago. Also—Widow [Abe] Grant David Grant & wife came in to Alf's today

Sunday Aug 29th, 1880

W. W. Cloudy all day. It is getting to look like fall now. All of us home today. Harold is sick of a cold.

Monday Aug 30th, 1880

W. N. Fine and glorious. F & I hewing ton timber. Dan & Alf went to Corbara on a horse trade. Little Hal is quite sick but as it seems to be but a cold, we hope he will soon be well again.

Tuesday Aug 31st, 1880

W. N. Fine again. F & I hewing ton timber. We finished. We have got over two tons. Dan & Alf went out each with a load for himself. Dan traded our oxen with Ambrose Melanson for a horse. P.M. Mother and Cornelia cut a lot of straw in Jos Porter's field for making hats. Harold is a little better today. We sent and got a bottle of Cough balsam for him

Wednesday Sept 1st, 1880

W. S.W. Fine & very warm. F & I dug potatoes today to send to the W. Indies by Ed Rice for molasses. We want to send eight barrels, but we did not get all digged. I think our potatoe crop is going to be "fair". Alf plowed some in the orchard today.

Yesterday afternoon Dan went to Carbara & traded our oxen with A. Melanson for a horse, then we took his oxen & traded with Will Cosman for his McDonald oxen. We

got them this morning. They are large and appear to be splendid oxen. Dan has been chopping today. Tonight Cornelia and I shelled out the heads of Mother's wheat straw she got yesterday Little Harold is getting better.

Thursday Sept 2nd, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. A.M. Alf and Scot finished ploughing a piece in the orchard which they began yesterday. F & I finished digging our potatoes. We have digged about 30 bushels P.M. Alf has been trying to burn his brush. Dan went out today with his new horse. "John Pedler" got his dinner here today & is at Alf's tonight. I finished a little craddle today for Leslie. Harold is most well again.

Friday Sept 3rd, 1880

W. S.W. Cloudy this morning & looking some like rain, but cleared off. F. went out to Weymouth & down to Edinborough with Alf's horse. A.M. I went to the mill with Dan and his new horse to look at some pine planks. P.M. D. chopping. I hauled up six loads of mud out of the pasture. Mother is laid up with a boil on her neck.

Saturday Sept 4th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine & very warm. F. helping Jos. Porter reap wheat. Alf started early this morning up to Bloomfield on a horse trade. Scot went with him. Dan went out with his new horse and a load. I hauled swamp mud all day. There is a terrible excitement now occassioned by an attrocious murder recently perpertrated. Joe "Nick" Tebo, they say, has murdered a pauper – Topsy Purdy – in the woods near Annapolis and attempted to burn the remains, but he was scared away from his work by some men. Joe, with his wife and son, have been arrested. Roxy got a new paper tonight "Floral Cabinet"

Sunday Sept 5th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine and extremely warm – undoubtedly the warmest day of the season.

It has been a somewhat remarkable day in our Family History, as D. Fullerton has entered upon the responsibility of a parent. "The-past-night has been filled with music" and grave faced matrons with significant expressions have moved mechanically to & fro through the long hours of darkness and about nine Oclock this morning a little baby girl was ushered into this bad world. F. went out this morning to hear Willoughby – he did not

not have any meeting here tonight. Alf got home this afternoon with a new horse. Mother is no better.

Monday Sept 6th, 1880

W. W. Fine & warm. A.M. F & I helped Alf dig potatoes P.M. F & I digged some more down on the hill, and hauled them home. Dan has finished chopping his piece today Leslie has got a bad cold and F. has not got over his cold yet.

Tuesday Sept 7th, 1880

W. S.W. Quite warm. Dan chopping all day. A.M. I worked in the Shop fitting up my work-bench &c. F. Sick – has been laying down all the forenoon. P.M. F & I hauling out bushes and clearing away a place to get Swamp-muck at this end of the "Swamp." Alf is barreling up potatoes &c.

F. is in a very bad state of health. If he does not get help I fear he will not get over it. Mother's boil is getting better. Leslie's cold is about the same.

Elizah Mullen and Clara Bell Prime have been married lately.

Wednesday Sept 8th, 1880

W. S.E. Quite fine and warm till towards night when it clouded up and sprinkled some. F. fixing the dump-cart wheels. Dan went out with a load of wood. Alf & I each went out with a load of potatoes to put on board the Eureka for the West Indies. I took eight barrels which are to go on freight and for which we expect molasses. Alf took nine barrels which he sold to Rice.

Thursday Sept 9th, 1880

W. N.E. Blowing quite heavily with some rain through the forenoon. Cloudy & dark all the afternoon. F. making shingles for Dan. Dan went in the woods and hauled home another shingle-log. I made Harold a pair of shoes. It is his birth-day. Scot gave him a little cap & a book as birth-day presents, and Mother gave him a picture card. He and Leslie have very bad coughs. Annie has named her little girl Mary Alice – a very pretty and substantial name though somewhat antiquated.

Friday Sept 10th, 1880

W. E. Cloudy, windy with some slight showers. A.M. Dan went to the mill and got a load of hemlock boards for his house. He took a stick for a sled tongue to the mill for F who accompanied him there, sawed it out and brought. I mended Roxy's slipper. Alf cutting cord-wood. P.M. Dan has been running about the road with Henry Green and one Britten who are on a horse-trading excursion. F & I started our ton-timber out of the woods, and loaded two on the cart for market.

Saturday Sept 11th, 1880

W. N.E. Rained some through the night and a little this morning. It was misty windy raw and cold till about noon when it cleared off beautifully. I went out today with two sticks of ton-timber to Campbells – they made 43 ft – over a ton. I got a bbl of flour at E. John's on D. Fullerton's acp – price, I think, \$7.25. Dan went out today with a load of wood. F fixed the dump-cart wheels. This afternoon Alf & Annie Willoughby went down the River. I got a letter from Mr. Skinner. F is getting better. Mother is having a bad time with a boil on her neck.

Sunday Sept 12th, 1880

W. S.W. It has been a glorious day. All of us home – Nothing of note occurred. Alf came home tonight. Jos. Porter is here this evening.

Monday Sept 13th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. A.M. F. A. & I. helped Dan put up his rafters. P.M. Alf went out with a load. F & I hauling out bushes to dig mud. Dan hewed a stick for an axel and cut his leg. I sent a letter to Chas W. Denton for Father.

Tuesday Sept 14th, 1880

W. S. Cloudy and looking like rain. A.M. I made a "goad stick". I went down to the burnt land to look at the buck-wheat. I find it most fit to cut. I then began picking up wind-fall apples. Dan working at his axel. F. splitting shingles. Alf cutting C-wood. P.M. F gathered the Daddy Apples & then went at work at the old wheels again. Alf starting up cord-wood. Dan went to Tusket to see Still Mullen. I finished picking up apples, & then put a couple of windows in the shop.

Wednesday Sept 15th, 1880

W. E. Began Raining in the night & continued through the day.

Dan has been working at his axel &c. A.M. F. helped Alf fix one of the truck wheels P.M. He has been making shingles I got out a lot of Stuff today for Dan's sashes.

Thursday Sept 16th, 1880

W. N.W. Rained some in the night – all day clearing off. Dan working at his shaves. F. A & I began reaping our crazy buck-wheat. It is pretty fair.

Friday Sept 17th, 1880

W. Westerly Glorious Day. This morning we got the sheep up and F. killed one this forenoon. Alf & I reapped till noon. P.M. F A & I reapping. Dan working at his cart.

Saturday Sept 18th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine. F. finished reaping the crazy buckwheat, mowed part of the oats, and butchered a sheep, that got strangled most to death – being yoked with a ram. Dan digging some dirt out of his cellar. I went to Weymouth with a load of ton-timber – 39 feet. Alf started to go out with a load of H-bark but by Como's got his harness broke and came home. I got two gallons of molasses on Alf's apc. I ordered \$3.00 placed to the credit of the School Section & charged to F. Roxy weighed all the babies today and the following is the figures: -- Harold 30lbs4oz Leslie 15lbs7oz Alice 9lbs9oz William Young died one day this week. (F finished reaping.)

Sunday Sept 19th, 1880

W. W. Fine. Alf, Chattie & Annie W. visiting at WHS's P.M. Cornelia, Harold Scot & I went up to Social Meeting. Bifore Service concluded Harold set up to go home so we came out with him. It is the first time he has ever been to meeting, outside of our house.

Monday Sept 20th, 1880

W. W. Cloudy all day – Some little dashes of rain. Alf went out with a load of bark to Journeay. He went down to Jasper Whites and got a bbl of herring. Dan tinkering around. He is not very well. He began boarding in his

house. A.M. F. & I. finished mowing the oats, and fixed up a place to thresh on. We threshed awhile before noon. P.M. we went down to thresh but a shower of rain coming on we were obliged to suspend operations. We came home. I worked till night planing out Sash stuff for Dan. F. at his old wheels

Tuesday Sept 21st, 1880

W. S. Foggy – misty all day. Alf starting cord-wood. Dan riding about on his horses all day. F. making shingles for Dan I have planing out Sash Stuff for Dan.

Wednesday Sept 22nd, 1880

W. N.W. Quite fine. Dan rigged up his horses in a Span and went out with a load of wood. A.M. F & I hauled up a load of ton-timber chips for wood, then I hauled a load of poles to fix the fence around the potatoes, after which F. A. & I. tired a pair of cart wheels. P.M. F. A. & I. finished threshing the curly buck-wheat. Roxy & Cornelia, with little Leslie spent the afternoon at Old Mrs. Wagoner's. I went down there tonight, took tea and helped carry Leslie home. Ezra Barr came here tonight to work for us.

Thursday Sept 25th, 1880

W. N. Glorious weather. F. Ez A. & I reaping buckwheat.

Dan went out with a load of wood. Still Mullen began working at D's house. Cornelia is up to Peter's this afternoon.

Friday Sept 24th, 1880

W. N.W. We finished reaping today, raked up the oats and hauled them home – cut the beans and hauled them home.

Cornelia has gone down to Mrs W. to a party

Saturday Sept 25th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine and warm. A.M. F. threshed the beans. Ez and I hauling up buckwheat. P.M. Ez. Alf & I hauled up all the buck wheat & stood it up by the bark – F threshing beans. Dan peddling around all day. Tonight we rigged up the truck & Alf, Chattie & Annie Willoughby, with Roxy, Leslie, Cornelia & I went out to Darkey Club. Roxy and Leslie came back with Harris Cosman & Clark

Mosely and Clarinda Swift came in with us. We had a great spree.

Sunday Sept 26th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine & pleasant. Ezra went home this morning. Nothing of note occurred. Cornelia & I went down to the Lake this afternoon.

Monday Sept 27th, 1880

W. S. Cloudy all day & looking like rain. F & I hauled up the Curly buck wheat & cleaned it up. We had 20 ½ bushels. We also hauled up the Straw. There were a party of girls here this afternoon with Mosely, who amused the company with foolish "monkey shines". Alf went out today with a load of cord-wood. Dan began reaping his buckwheat. I got a letter tonight from Mr Herbert.

Tuesday Sept 28th, 1880

W. S. – Showery. A.M. I not being well, did nothing. F. making shingles. Alf fixing his cord-wood body all day. P.M. Dan went up the Bay & took Cornelia Ring home. F. went with them to Weymouth but did not return tonight. I hauled up two load of chips for fire wood.

Wednesday Sept 29th, 1880

W. S.W. Foggy till noon – cleared off beautifully. A.M. Dan hauled out a load of clear pine from the mill for his carpenter. I mowed the clover down in the orchard by Blin's. P.M. Dan is reaping buckwheat. I mowed some breaks and rushes along the road. Alf went out today with a load of deals. F. Stayed all night at WH Prime's – came in this forenoon and this afternoon helped Dan reap buckwheat. We started our Temperance club again tonight.

Thursday Sept 30th, 1880

W. N.W. Glorious weather. A.M. F. & A. cut and hewed some stuff for a horse-stable floor. I hauled some water – a load of wood – worked at D's sashes some &c. P.M. F. A. & I. hauled up the stable floor stuff. F & A then went threshing buckwheat & I raked up and hauled home my brakes.

Dan reaping buckwheat.

Friday Oct 1st, 1880

W. W. Beautiful. A.M. I hauled a load of water, pitched off my brakes – spread out a lot of straw to dry – fixed my sash-plane &c. F & A laid the h-stable floor. P.M. F. A. & I. threshing buck-wheat.

Dan finished his buck wheat – finished his oats &c. Judson came tonight and got the winnow machine.

Saturday Oct 2nd, 1880

W. S W. Fine. Dan threshing buck wheat. F. A. & I. finished threshing our buckwheat today. Willoughby came here today. I mailed a letter to Mr Skinner. I got a letter tonight from Hallett & Co. Mother got a letter from Mrs Smith (Brier Island).

Sunday Oct 3rd, 1880

W. S W. Fine. F. M. & I went out this morning to hear Willoughby Text. Cor. 10th & last of fourth verse. "And that rock was Christ." After meeting I went down to WHS's where I remained till night. F & D went up to hear Mr Gates this evening

Monday Oct 4th, 1880

W. S. Looking all day like rain. A.M. F & I hauled in a load of clover out of my little field – spread out the buckwheat straw to dry – carried in the Curly B.W. Straw. P.M. F & I hauled in the buckwheat straw – Carried in the buckwheat we had out drying, and then went down and helped Dan get in his oats – four loads. Tom Barnes – one of Dan's caulking mates was here to dinner. Alf went out with a load of boards.

Tuesday Oct 5th, 1880

W. S.W. Cloudy and showery all day. Dan went out to F. Town to work this morning. I – not being well – slept all the forenoon. F. making shingles for Dan. P.M. F & I unloaded a load of buckwheat straw he then went at Dan's Shingles & I at the sashes.

Alf went out today with a load of wood for L. Nichols.

Wed Oct 6th, 1880

W. S. Misty till noon – wind shifted and cleared away beautifully. A.M. F made a "(diagram)" for one of the cows. Alf & I cleaned up our green buck wheat; we had 26 bushels – making in all 46 ½. P.M. F. making shingles for D. Scot & I went to the mill and got a load of Deals. Scot went with me for beech nuts. I cut down a tree by the mill road, & left him to pick nuts while I went to the mill. Down by Dan's brush I saw a bear-track. F & I bundled up shingles in the shop tonight.

Note: John draws a simple diagram of a four-board "cow poke" in quotations above. This was a simple device bolted on a cow's neck to keep it from pushing through fences.

Thursday Oct 7th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but windy & raw. F & Alf sat a bear-trap. I took 1234 ft of Deals to Campbells for myself. I bought two stove pots: they cost \$1.00 & 70. I heard of another murder down at Saulnierville. Gus McCauly & Thelda Wagoner married tonight.

Friday Oct 8th, 1880

W. N. W. Fine. Alf went out with a load of Deals. F & I commenced digging potatoes – digged 15 bushels today

Saturday Oct 9th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. F. Scot. and I digging – we finished our "Early Rose" – digged 40 bushels. Alf started up two loads of wood. This morning Alf & I went across the lake to the bear-trap. Dan came home tonight from Frenchtown. Joe Cornwell is over to Alf's tonight sparking with Annie Willoughby

Sunday Oct 10th, 1880

W. S.W. Beautiful. All "hands" home. Alf & Chattie, Annie Willoughby and Joe Cornwell were here to tea. "Bumble bee" Chute preached up the road tonight from 1st Thes. 4th chap & last verse. Several of us went up to hear him.

Monday Oct 11th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine. A.M. Dan fixing up his truck. F. went to the mill for a block of pine to make a plough shire mould. P.M. Dan went to the mill and got a load of Stuff for his Carpenters. F. trying to get the plough shires off. Dan & Annie with their baby went out to W.H.S's tonight. Dan is going to start in the night for Frenchtown. Scot & I

have been digging potatoes all day. We dug 35 bushels. Alf went out today with a load of cordwood. He brought us a bbl of flour from E. John's on Dan's apc

Tuesday Oct 12th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine all day. Tonight a cloud came up in the N.W. & rained heavily this evening. F. made a plow shire mould. As a Porter has been here today and made us a Dutch Yoke. Alf has been digging today with Isiah W--helping him. I have been digging with Dick & Geo. Robart helping me. I put in 47 bushels.

Wednesday Oct 13th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy – windy & cold – Clear tonight. A.M. Alf went out to Weymouth with the carriage. He took out Father who has gone to Yarmouth to attend the Agriculture Exhibition. Mother went out too. I went up to the mill and got a load of slabs for fire-wood. Charley Sabean digged potatoes for me today. Jos. Porter sent him. P.M. We picked up and hauled up 30 bushels. We had Club tonight. Roxy, Scot & I went. Dick Stanley Charley Prime & Joe Como. Still Mullen spent the Evening here.

Thursday Oct 14th, 1880

W. N.W. Clear, Windy & cold. Scot & I digging potatoes. I put in 30 bushels.

Alf has been digging, & hauling cord w [May] & Robbie W--. have been here this evening.

Friday Oct 15th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and warm. Scot & I digging potatoes – put in 40 bushels. Alf went out with a load of c-wood. F. got home from Yarmouth this afternoon. Charley Sabean & Robbie W—are here this evening.

Saturday Oct 16th, 1880

W. S.W. Fine & warm. This morning Alf & I went to the bear-trap. F, Scot & I digging all day – finished. We have got about 300 bushels of potatoes. Alf has been tinkering around. As a Porter sent up today and got the steers that he is going to break. Dan came home tonight from F. town. I got a letter tonight from Mr Skinner. Alf went down to Henry Lewis's tonight and got two pigs – one for himself & one for us. Lewis sent F. \$10.00.

Sunday Oct 17th, 1880

W. S.W. Cloudy but mild. All of us home. This afternoon I went down in the woods and got some gum.

Monday Oct 18th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine & beautiful. A.M. I was quite unwell – having a bad cold. I spent the forenoon in the lounge. Alf went down to the mill with a load of buck-wheat. Chattie went with him. Dan went to the mill & got a load of Stuff for his house. P.M. Dan & Annie went out to the doctor with their baby. I hauled four load of top-dressing down to my little field. This evening I went up to the mill and got a load of slabs to use where we are going to dig mud. F. helping around.

Tuesday Oct 19th, 1880

W. N. Fine. F. Began digging mud down under the hill. Jim Manzer has been helping him. I hauled out seven loads of top-dressing. Alf and Chattie got home tonight with their flour. Leroy Amero from Edinborough got dinner here. We had a club tonight – a very pleasant meeting. Mrs Peter Wagoner and Phebe Sabean.

Wednesday Oct 20th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine. A hail-storm came up this morning, but did not last long F. and Jim digging mud. Jim stopped here last night. Scot took a load of shingles down for Dan. F. let Dan have five bundles of shingles. I mended my boot and hauled out a load of top-dressing. Eth Ring and Johnny Dunkley came came here this afternoon. This evening They & I went across the lake to the bear-trap.

Thursday Oct 21st, 1880

W. W. Fine. F. sawing lath for Dan. Alf went to Weymouth with a load. A.M. Dan went to the mill and got a load of stuff. P.M. Dan hauling stones for his cellar. Johny Dunkley went home this morning. I hauled some water this forenoon and did some chores around. P.M. Eth, Scot, Robbie W. & I gathered apples.

Friday Oct 22nd, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy & looking like rain. F. sawing lath for Dan. Dan hauling stones. Eth hunting partridges. I have been gathering apples all day. Yesterday & today I have gathered about 32 bushels of apples. We had a paring party tonight – pared 2 bbls. Old David Grant came in tonight.

Saturday Oct 23rd, 1880

W. S.E. Tremendous rain-storm and gale last night. The baldwin apple tree in the garden and the daddy tree at the end of the house were split to the ground – I would not have had it done for ten dollars. I am not well today and have lain in bed all day or all the forenoon. P.M. I have worked at D's sashes. F has been splitting shingles. Dan is making a truck harness. Old David went out tonight. Alf took him out part way.

Sunday Oct 24th, 1880

W. W. Dark and cloudy and occassionally a shower. A.M. F. M and Dan went out to hear Willoughby He and W.H.S. came in with them. Willoughby preached here in the evening WH Sabean stayed here all night too.

Monday Oct 25th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy, Dark & Cold with hail stones flying. F. Ethel & I gathering apples. Alf gathering apples &c. Dan hauling stones for his cellar. Mother got a letter from Mrs Arrowsmith

Tuesday Oct 26th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy till noon – Clear till night. A.M. Eth, Scot & I finished gathering the apples – We have got about 75 bushels. P.M. F. shoveled out the sink hole. Eth & I took a cruise to the bear-trap and around by the mill. Dan has been hauling stones. Alf went to the Bridge with a load of cord-wood.

We had Club tonight.

Wednesday Oct 27th, 1880

W. S. Began raining in the night and showery all day. F. made a mould for a plow shire. I worked at Dan's sashes. Dan making harness. Alf shoemaking.

This morning I am revising the Ritual and Constitution of our "Society".

Thursday Oct 28th, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudy & misty all day. F. finished his mould. Dan at his harness. I have been at D's sashes. Leslie can sit alone now. He is real smart and well.

Friday October 29th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and beautiful. A.M. I fixed up my new dutch yoke - putting on the hammocks &c. I also made or worked a little at Dan's Sashes. Alf ploughing. P.M. Alf, Chattie & mother at the school examination. I went to the mill & got out a load of boards to take to Weymouth tomorrow. Dan got two loads of stuff from the mill for his house and, I believe, digged some potatoes. F. went out today with Dan's horse. He took out a plough shire mould to go to Yarmouth. He got a new grind stone Ethel went out with him on his way home. I mailed a letter to Mr Herbert.

Saturday Oct 30th, 1880

W. N.W. Shifted to S.E. Fine till towards night when it clouded up and looked like rain. F. sawing for Dan. Dan went out this afternoon with a load of wood. Alf went down the River this afternoon taking with him Chattie & Annie W. I went today with a load of boards to Geo. Hoyt. I took 1011 ft. 481 spruce 463 Pine 67 refuse. I got 4 galls molasses 1 gal parafin oil. I got materials to make Mother a dress amounting to about 4 dollars. I mailed a letter to Hallet & Co & one to Dongall & Co. They say that Ellen McAlpine & David Whitehouse are married. H. Lewis came & got the [Jinn] cow

Sunday Oct 31st, 1880

W. S.E. Rained heavily all day. Nothing of note occurred. All hands home reading &c.

Harris brought mother a letter from Geo Dunbars

Monday Nov 1st, 1800

W. N.W. Fine. F. hauled a load of wood and has been choring around all day. Dan digging his potatoes. Alf got home at noon. This afternoon he has been starting up cord wood. A.M. I began making a trundle bead-stead. P.M. I went to Weymouth for our little Fannie McNeil who has been at Mr Geo Dunbar's for a week. I went down to Mrs Cotter's, but she had no money for me. I left her my bill which is as follows:---

Tuesday Nov 2nd, 1880

W. N.W. Fine. A.M. F. filing a saw. I finished the trundle bed. P.M. F. went to the mill & Sluiced the chips. I planed out some Sash Stuff for Dan, and put out a load of top-dressing. Dan peddling around. Alf went out with a load of wood. Scot & I went to club tonight. Peddlar John came here tonight.

Wednesday Nov 3rd, 1880 – Thanksgiving day –

W. N.W. Fine and beautiful.

Roxy & I with our little Leslie went with the oxen and cart, and spent the day at W.H. Sabean. Annie with her baby went as far as Aunt Sarah's where she spent the day. F. did nothing today but make a grind-stone bench. Dan went out with two loads of wood. Scot went with him. Alf gunning. Capt. S.A. Steele got home tonight.

Thursday Nov 4th, 1880

W. W. Fine and warm.

Dan hauled some slabs from the mill &c. Alf went out with a load of wood. F & I repairing the mill. We put in some new flume posts. Janey Cosman spent the day here. John Journeay of Weymouth has died very lately. Hal got in a mud hole back of the barn today

Friday Nov 5th, 1880

W. S. Cloudy & looking like rain. Began to rain about Four Oclock and continues moderately yet (9 oclock). Alf starting up wood. Dan went out with a load. F & I repairing the mill We pared a barrel of apples tonight for Annie.

Saturday Nov 6th, 1880

W. S. Partly clear till non - Showery and dull till night. Dan starting cord wood. Alf went out with a load of

wood. F & I repairing the mill. P.M. We made a float and took it up to the head of the lake.

I finished revising the Lodge books tonight. Leslie has got a cold.

Sunday Nov 7th, 1800

W. S. Rained heavily all night and till towards night – heaviest rain we have had this fall. All of us home today reading &c. Leslie is all right again.

Monday Nov 8th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but windy and raw. Dan working down at his place. F & Alf went to Weymouth to the Temperance Election. I worked all day at Dans Windows. Tonight I went up to Geo. Sabean's, and took up the Club Ritual.

Tuesday Nov 9th, 1800

W. N.W. Fine. F. went to the mill and sawed some for Dan. He then came home and peeled turnips till night. Jim Manzer worked here today; he is employed by Dan to return my work on Dan's sashes. He and Alf have been pulling turnips. I worked at D's sashes. Dan has been working down to his place. Webster Grant, his wife & Child came in today – they are going to stay till Sunday. Mother and Annie have been down to Mrs Wagoner's visiting. We had club tonight, and another was there and joined.

Wednesday Nov 10th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, beautiful weather. I have been at D's sashes. I got them all together but one. F. has been at one of Alf's truck wheels. Alf hauled up the last of the turnips. There were about 35 bushels. Alf then helped F. at the wheel. Dan down at his house to work. Jim Manzer gathered the cabbage he then chopped till night down here in the woods. Hittie Ring "borned" a little boy today.

Thursday Nov 11th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy all day. Dan went out with a load of wood. A.M. F & A tired the truck wheel I finished Dan's other sash. I then hauled some water after which F & I got up some fire wood. I wrote a petition for Jim Manzer concerning a proposed road from Enoch Mullen's to the

Langford Road. P.M. F & I started to go raft logs. We went down to the lake, got the boat ready to cross, when the wind shifted. We came home. I went to bed and layed till night. F cut some wood. Will Cosman is here this evening doing the "15" puzzle. One of Peter Nowlan's little children died today of scarlet fever. I had two papers come tonight from Hallett

Friday Nov 12th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine – scattering clouds & windy. Alf went out with a load. Dan went out with a load. F & I cutting coal-pit wood. Obed White spent the evening here. Another of Peter N's little children is dead.

Saturday Nov 13th, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudy & windy. Dan went out with a load. Alf fixed his horse stable, and then he and Webster went partridge hunting. F & I cutting coal-pit wood all day. Roxy got a letter from Hit Ring tonight. She has got a little baby boy. It was born last Wednesday. Jim Manzer came today, and got two bbls of apples

Sunday Nov 14th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine all day. All of us home. Mrs Webster Grant was here awhile this forenoon. Willie Marshal came in this afternoon and took them home. I have been reading Spurgeon's Sermons &c.

Monday Nov 15th, 1880

W. E. Cloudy – Began snowing about noon and continued till evening. I think between 1 & 2 inches has fallen. This morning I went up to Wagoner's mill and helped Alf put some logs on the roll away. I then came home, and F & I hauled coal-pit wood the rest of the day. We broke the hammock chain and had to spend a part of the afternoon in mending it. Dan has been out today with a load – he started in the night. I got twelve pictures from Hallett. -- also a letter, or rather some circulars from him. A paper came for Eugenie Cosman, and I went up tonight and took it to her.

Tuesday Nov 16th, 1880

W. variable. The wind was quite fair this morning for rafting, so father and went over the lake, picked up a few logs and got them down to the big cove, when it rained &

snowed & the wind shifted, so we came home & hauled cord-wood till night. Alf has been hauling cord-wood & broke his axel, and hurt his leg We had Club tonight. Gavil joined. Fine tonight.

Wednesday Nov 17th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and warm. F & I finished the coal-pit and set it on fire. Alf went out with a load. I began puttying Dan's windows tonight. Aunt Sally Green died today

Thursday Nov 18th, 1880

W. S.E. Fine till noon – Rained till night. F & I butchered the hog this forenoon. P.M. I puttied sashes for Dan. Alf & Chattie went to the Bridge today Henry Sabean began Dan's flue.

Friday Nov 19th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine and cold. F. tending coal-pit and rigged up the new grind-stone. Alf fixing up his axel. I went down to Dan's house and brought up a load of sashes, I puttied all day, and finished all, but the two peak sashes. Dan has been tending around. Tonight Dan & I took all the sashes down and put them in. Henry Sabean came up here tonight. Little Harold was real sick this morning, but he is a good deal better tonight.

Saturday Nov 20th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy, but pleasant till evening when a violent rain storm came up, accompanied by high wind. Dan has been at work about his place. Alf making his cart axel. F. tending around. Roxy & I with our little Leslie went up the Bay. At Weymouth I purchased a pair of pants from Geo. Taylor for which I paid \$4.50cts cash. I also bought at Campbells a cap – price 35cts and a neck tie 14cts both of which I paid for. We got up to Mrs Rings about-half past two. This evening Ethel and I spent the evening at Mr Dunkley's. Freeman White died today Dannie Stanton and brother drowned

Sunday Nov 21st, 1880

W. N.W. Fine – but terribly windy and cold. Roxy and I took dinner at Mr Dunkley's. This evening Mrs Ring, Roxy & I went up and heard Mr Parker.

Monday Nov 22nd, 1880

W. N.W. Windy & cold. I spent the day at Uncle John's. Roxy and Leslie stopped at Gamma Ring's

Tuesday Nov 23rd, 1880

W. unchanged – cold. I spent the forenoon at Dunkley's. P.M. Roxy and I came home We found it pretty cold, but got home safely about dusk. Alf went out today with a load of wood.

Wednesday Nov 24th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but cold. Dan down to his place. We butchered the cow this afternoon &c. Dan began boarding at Como's today.

Thursday Nov 25th, 1880

W. S.E. Began Snowing this morning and continue till toward night, when the wind shifted. Snowed about 2 inches. This forenoon F & I piled up a lot of cord-wood at the corner which Jim Manzer cut. There was about three cords of it. P.M. F & I cut up the beef. Dan went out today with a load. Bought his stove

Friday Nov 26th, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudy, and quite cold. Snow flying all day. A.M. F & I made shoes for the oxen. P.M. F A & I put them on. Little Leslie has got a little cold. Henry S. finished D's flue

Saturday Nov 27th, 1880

W. S.E. Some snow flying – warm and pleasant. A.M. F. fixed the ox-straps – making a new one. We then hauled wood till noon. P.M. F. fixed the top of the flue I went to the mill and got out a load of lumber, Dan hauling slabs and working around his house. Tom Wilson here to dinner.

Sunday Nov 28th, 1880

W. S.W. Clear – fine and warm all day. All of us home. I have spent the day in reading.

Dan came home last night.

Monday Nov 29th, 1880

W. S.E. Snowed an inch or two in the night – turned to rain which drizzled till night, when the wind shifted. F. mended Fannies shoes. I have been tinkering around at one thing & another. P.M. I went in the woods – got a piece of wood & made a goad stick.

Tuesday Nov 30th, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but cold & windy F. choring around. I went to the bridge with a load 749 ft of Pine Spruce 204. Deals 133 S roots 40. I got a bbl a flower to E. John's on Dan's apc – price \$7.50. I got four gals molasses – four gals parafin oil. I got an axe – Some Sugar – some leather, a little Christmas Book for Hal, &c. Judson & Herbie came in with me. I stopped there and got my tea. After we got home we went up to club. It being the night for the election of officers they had appointed them before we got there.

Wednesday Dec 1st, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy – Began snowing about noon and continued till night when the wind shifted N again – about 1 inch fell. A.M. F & I worked some at our coalpit, and fixed the barn door. P.M. I mended my boots. F doing some chores around.

Thursday Dec 2nd, 1880

W. N.W. Fine, but cold. Alf went out with a load of wood F & I drew the cold pit. We had 53 bushels of coal.

Friday Dec 3rd, 1880

W. N.W. Quite fine, but cold and windy. I have been mending my boots all day. F. doing chores around. Alf & Chattie went out to go up the Bay this afternoon. Dan traded the White cow away with Walter Mullen today. Dan got his tea here tonight then went back to the corner again. It is real Winter weather.

Saturday Dec 4th, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudy with scattering snow flying and quite cold. I finished fixing my boots this morning. I then spent the remainder of the forenoon in repairing the stable. P.M. F & I cut & hauled nine drags of fire wood.

Joe Nick's Trial is in the full blast this week. Dan went out today.

Sunday Dec 5th, 1880

W. S.E. Beautifully fine. W.H. Sabean & Willie White spent the day and evening here. Dan came up a while – got his dinner &c.

Monday Dec 6th, 1880

W. S.E. Shifted to N.W. Foggy and thawing this morning. Wind shifted and cleared off towards night – Pleasant warm day. A.M. F & Dan butchered Dan's heifer. Jim Manzer helped me haul up mud. I hauled five loads and put in the "slough". D & J were here to dinner. P.M. F & I fixed the cart wheel, We then loaded up a load of bark for market. Several children on the Town-ship line have lately died of Diphtheria. Alf & Chattie came home from up the Bay tonight – brought Roxy a letter from her mother.

Tuesday Dec 7th, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudy, with snow and squalls but mild, – About 2 inches fell. I went out and took Journeay's a load of hemlock-bark – a cord. I took out a hide. Dan went out with a load of wood. F. cutting fire-wood &c.

Wednesday, Dec 8th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy – but pleasant. F. Went to the mill and cut logs. I have been sick all day and have "Kept within, silent, or speaking little". Gavil cut wood here today.

Thursday Dec 9th, 1880

W. N. Clear and fine. About 5 inches of snow came last night – enough with the little that was on before, for very good sledding. Dan went out today with a load of wood on his cart. F. has been helping Alf get fire wood. I made –or rather partly made – a craddle for Annie.

Friday Dec 10th, 1880

W. Easterly. Clear and sharp. Joseph Porter and I went out to the Alrite place and got each a load of hay. Dan went out with a load, & Alf went out with a load. F fixed up a pig sty and done some repairing around generally. George Johnson of Weymouth died this morning at four

Oclock. His loss will be greatly regretted, as he was held in high esteem by all who knew him.

Joe Nick Thibault has been sentenced to be hanged on Feb 8th. Mrs. Alride has lately died

Saturday Dec 11th, 1880

W. N. Fine and pleasant. Joseph P. and I went to the Alride farm and got the rest of the hay. Scott went over with us and stopped to "Gampa Kilpines" till we came along. Alf went out today I got some circulars from True & Co

Sunday Dec 12th, 1880

W. W. Fine and warm. Dan came up in the night and stopped here to breakfast, and then left. David Sabean & a Ross girl were to Alf's tonight Old Colin and "Jesse" were here a while tonight I have spent the day in reading.

Monday Dec 13th, 1880

W. S. Cloudy this forenoon. Began raining at noon, and continued drizzling till night. A.M. F & I hauled up five loads of mud and put under the stable. P.M. I worked at Annie's craddle. Alf is making a sort of pung sleigh.

Tuesday Dec 14th, 1880

W. W. Beautifully fine and warm. A.M. I finished Annie's cradle. P.M. F & I hauled up six load of mud and put under the stable. We had a splendid club meeting tonight. Jim Manzer and Fannie McNeil joined tonight One Charlie Johnson – a Darkey, visited our meeting and gave us some spirited songs.

Wednesday Dec 15th, 1880

W. S.E. Cloudy – Began raining towards noon and continued till most night – not very heavily. A.M. F & I started a lot of hemlock logs out of the woods to go to Wagoner's Mill. The storm drove us before we them all hauled. P. M. I painted Annie's craddle. Alf & Chattie have gone down the River to ANNIE WILLOUGHBY'S wedding.

Thursday Dec 16th, 1880

W. N.W. Cloudy – but mild. F. repairing the mill. I have been sick all day, and remained at home. P.M. I made an ax handle, or got one "under weigh" Alf got home tonight from his wedding excursion.

Friday Dec 17th, 1880

W. N. Cloudy and quite cold. F & I cutting and hauling logs to the mill – hauled 25. I brought home a load of reffuse boards. Alf making a sled-sleigh.

Mrs Burns of Plympton, last night had her house burned down and herself perished in the fire

Friday Dec 24th, 1880

W. N.E. Fine. I started at Day-light for the Cove with Geo Sabean's keel. Judson stopped all night and went out with me this morning. Geo. S—went out with me. We got to the cove about noon. F sawing today.

Saturday Dec 25th, 1880

Christmas Day

W. N.E. Fine and beautiful Alf and Chattie went down the River early this morning W.H. & Lydia came in and spent the day. We have had a very pleasant time.

Sunday Dec 26th, 1880

W. N.E. Cloudy but mild. Mother and Roxy, with Harold and Leslie in a basket on Scot's sled, went out to Aunt Sarah's. I went out tonight and met them. I am very unwell these days. Today I can hardly stand. F. has got a boil on his finger. Alf & Chattie came home tonight. Mrs G came in with them.

Monday Dec 27th, 1880

W. N.E. Blowing heavily and snowing some. We have done nothing today saving some chores. I have lain to bed part of the time.

Mother has been over to Alf's visiting. F. got tea over there. Alonzo Grant is here tonight.

Roxy went and we took Leslie up in a basket on the sled Winnie and Annie Kate are here to stay all night. Little Leslie says "Ducky – ducky – ducky."

I let him have \$2.55. This evening Wellington [Titus] held a meeting up the road to organize a singing School. The Attempt failed I went up to witness the proceedings.

W. W. Cloudy and quite cold. I went out with a load of Deals 1010 feet. I got 2 galls of molasses – a tweed dress for Roxy &c. "Old David" came in to Alf's today. F's sore finger is getting some better.

R--, R., Rox, Rocks, Birdie, Rocksanna, Roxy (Roxanna Ring) - John's wife. Born 23 Oct 1853 and died 10 Oct 1954.

Alf, A. (Alfred E. Sabean) - John's brother. Born 17 Jun 1855 and died 10 Feb 1929.

A, Annie (Annie Minerva Sabean) - John's sister. Born about 1851 and died 1934.

Cottie - see Scot (Charles Scott McAlpine)

F ("Father": Joseph H. Sabean) - John's father. Born about 1819 and died 5 Mar 1893.

M, Mother (Ruth McNeill) - John's mother. Born 1826 and died 1893.

W.H.S (William Henry Sabean) - William lived in Southville. He was a brother to Joseph Sabean and is an uncle to the author of the diaries. He was born 9 Feb 1835 and died 23 Feb 1921. He married Lydia Steele.

Geo. (anyone by the name of George)

P. Wagoner (Peter Wagoner) - lived nearby in Riverdale.

W. Cosman, Will C., Willie, W. (Will Cosman) - b.1862. Lived nearby in Riverdale.

G. Sabean (George Sabean)

C.T. (Charles Thomas) - Someone who came to work at the Sabin homestead?

J.E.W., John Edd. (John Edd Wagoner) - lived nearby in Riverdale.

Dan (Daniel Fullerton) - John's brother in law, his sister Annie's 2nd husband. Born 23 Oct 1853 and died 10 Oct1954.

Harold (Harold Fullerton "Hal" Sabine) - John and Roxanna's son, their first child. Known later in life as Hal, John refers to him as Harold in early entries in the diary. Born 9 Sept 1878 and died 19 Sept 1957.

Scot (Charles Scott McAlpine) - John's nephew, his sister Annie's son by her 1st husband, Charles Alexander McAlpine. Scot was born 18 April 1872 and died 30 June 1949.

Chattie (Charity Alice Grant) - John's sister in law, his brother Alf's wife. Born about 1855 and died 15 Feb 1933.

John Edd (John E. Wagoner) - lived nearby in Riverdale.

Jim Cosman (James Cosman) - lived nearby in Riverdale.












Annie Minerva Sabean (1851 - 1934), sister of John.




1871 map by A.F. Church showing the area surrounding Weymouth, Nova Scotia.
